Mild 	Find a picture of a famous European building like the Eiffel Tower and write a postcard describing seeing the building as a tourist.	Find out what the currency is in the European Union and work out how much of it you would get for £1.	Make a poster to encourage tourists to go to a European destination. What could you include on the poster to encourage people to go there? Here is an example of how you could set your poster out: How to set out your poster	Find out what transparent, translucent and opaque mean. Hot 	Research a famous European, such as Einstein, Monet or Anne Frank and write a fact file all about their life. Spicy 	Read some fairy tales by the Brothers Grimm and rewrite one of the stories, changing details to make it your own story. Here is the story of the Frog Prince, which you could choose to rewrite. Create a timeline with events that have happened in Europe. Make sure you include pictures on your timeline. You can find some information here: History of Europe	Devise an experiment to find out which colours reflect light the best. Design a jacket that with the most reflective colours that would be good to use in winter when it darker for longer periods.	Can you make a model of a European building from recycled materials?
