Purple Mash

Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)	Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)
 Get your child to play on <u>Times Table Rockstars</u>. Allow your child to play on <u>Hit the Button</u> - Focus on times tables (2,5 and 10) and Number Bonds. Play on <u>Top Marks Measuring in Centimetres</u> game. Play Level 1. Play <u>Telling the Time - Mathsframe</u> We are focusing on measurement including time, mass, temperature, capacity, length and height. Measure some objects in your house using a ruler or tape measure and write down the different sizes of these objects. Measure everyone in your family. Who is the tallest? Who is the shortest? Can you measure their different body parts? Were there any surprises? Can measure using paper clips? Can you estimate how many paper clips long a pencil is? 	 Create a poster all about Ocean Pollution and how we can all help to keep our ocean and beaches safe. Choose a video from <u>Literacy Shed</u> – choose one of the traditional tales and complete one of the suggested activities for the tale each day. Choose a video from <u>the thinking</u> <u>shed</u> and complete one of the suggested activities each day.

Topic:

We are learning about giving positive feedback and supporting each other. Using the simple obstacle course that has been set up, work with someone at home to help you to go around it. One person will wear a blindfold and the other will help the blindfolded one to navigate the course safely. What was supportive? What helped? What didn't help? How did the blindfolded person feel? How might you do it differently if you did it again?
