The children had a lovely afternoon and gave some thoughtful answers to questions.

We wanted to show people that we care, so we have sent letters and Christmas cards to two care homes in the local area. One Y2 child said, 'we have hope in our vision, so we want to give hope to others'.

They began the day listening intently to 'Henry' discuss all about the Tudor Dynasty, including the War of the Roses and the fate of each of Henry VIII's 6 wives. Throughout the day, the children were really engaged and asked some thought-provoking questions to 'Henry'. Some examples included:

"Why did Henry ban Catherine from seeing her own daughter?"

"Why was Henry VIII not allowed to divorce Catherine of Aragon at first?"
"Who was your favourite wife?"

It was a fantastic, fun day and the children learned an enormous amount about Henry VIII and what life was like in Tudor times!

PSHE Pupil Voice for Term 1 and 2

Pupils were asked if they learned new PSHE in their current year from the previous year group and what was different about their learning. Weekly Learning Review files were looked at in each class for evidence of learning and enjoyment of PSHE.

- "I learned how to take care of our school. I picked up the litter on our science walk"
- "My favourite part of this week is that I like school and everyone and I am glad I have friends"
- "In Year 1 we talked about Harold (the SCARF character) teaching about being kind. In Year 2 we help people and learn how to play with people."
- "We do 2 PSHE lessons every week. We learn about how to keep ourselves safe.
- "Your skin doesn't matter. You can be yourself".
- "No matter what you look like, you're my friend".
- "I'm learning about me and my relationships. It's about us and how we feel. PSHE makes me feel calm."
- "Last year it was about how we were feeling and this year is how other people are feeling".
- "We have improved by not hurting one another and not leaving people out."
- "My favourite part of the week was seeing my teachers and friends".
- "Right now we are doing emotions. Last year we were doing hazards. It's a bit harder now because we're getting older. Now we find answers to problems."

"In Year 5 we learnt about puberty and about how to stay safe. Now we learn about bullying and what to do about it. Now, in Year 6, it is getting us ready for secondary school. It is a little bit more in depth. Teachers explain it a bit more. A good thing about being in Year 6 is you have more experiences to share."

Global learning

Last year's MAD (Make a Difference) club were pleased to be able to support Rod Thorpe at the Christmas Fayre again this year. Rod is the Fairtrade contact for Chinnor Methodist Church, promoting and facilitating Fairtrade work on their behalf and kindly supports our Fairtrade in school.
