

Good News for Families

Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel

When the crowds asked John the Baptist, "What must we do?" He answered, "If anyone has two coats they should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same." There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and they said to him, "Master, what must we do?" He said to them, "Don't collect any more than you should." Then he said to some soldiers, "Don't force people to pay money to make you leave them alone, but be satisfied with your pay." By now, a feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John the Baptist might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, "I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not good enough even to until his sandal strap."

From the Gospel of Sunday 12th December 2021 Luke 3: 10-18 (the 3rd Sunday of Advent, Year C)

Wednesday's Word



"Read the gospels! This way we will learn what is most essential in our lives: love and mercy." Pope Francis

Who did the people think that John the Baptist might be? In this Sunday's Gospel, John the Baptist prepares the people for the coming of Jesus. He tells them to share with others and to show mercy – to put people (not money or power) first; to feel for those who suffer and to do something to help. Within the Catholic Church, these actions, attending to people's basic needs, are known as Corporal (or physical) Works of Mercy. Ask your child what the word 'mercy' means to them. You may want to share with your child what the word 'mercy' means to you. Can you or your child remember a time when you were merciful and gave someone another chance?

"God is merciful towards us. We too should learn to be merciful." Pope Francis

The Church also encourages us to perform Spiritual Works of Mercy. These include: being compassionate; being patient with others even if we are being treated unfairly; forgiving others (even if we feel they don't deserve forgiveness); sometimes giving people more than they deserve. Merciful people do things out of their love and care for others and this helps make the world a better place. Who do you know to be a merciful person? Each time we show 'mercy', we open ourselves to receive mercy from God. Each of you say if there is someone to whom you could show mercy this Advent.

What did Mary do when she heard about Elizabeth? In this Sunday's Gospel, even though Mary had many of her own preparations to make for the birth of Jesus, she still went out of her way to visit her elderly relative Elizabeth. Ask your child who they like to go and visit most? When did they last get a warm welcome and how did it make them feel? Who always makes them feel especially welcome and looked after? Tell your child about the people you like to visit.

As a family, think about people who visit your home. Each of you say who most fills you with jou when they call to visit. What are some of the things we can do to make visitors feel more welcome this Christmas? Is there someone that you can invite for a meal, or to play, and make them feel especially valued - maybe a relative who lives on their own, or maybe a friend from school? Come and visit Church together this Sunday, giving thanks to God for all your family and friends and for the many blessings that Christmas brings. All are warmly invited.

Enjoy reading the Gospel

Every year Joseph and Mary went to Jerusalem to celebrate the feast of the Passover. When Jesus was twelve he went with them. After the feast, on the way home, Mary and Joseph realised that Jesus was missing from the group. So they went back to Jerusalem to look for him. After three days, they found Jesus in the Temple, listening to the teachers and asking them questions. The teachers were amazed at his intelligence. His parents were overcome when they found him and told him how worried they had been. "Why were you looking for me?" asked Jesus. "Did you not know that I would be in my Father's house?" Then Jesus went back home to Nazareth and lived in obedience to his parents. He grew in wisdom and grew in favour with God and the people.



From the Gospel of Sunday 26th December 2021 Luke 2:41-52 (the Feast of the Holy Family, Year C)

Which words stood out for you in this Gospel, and why? What does the picture make you think about? Enjoy exploring this Wednesday's word, which is WISDOM.



"Wisdom is the grace of being able to see things through the eyes of God." Pope Francis

In which ways did Jesus grow when he went back to Nazareth with his parents? In this Sunday's Gospel we discover that, from a very young age, Jesus was filled with wisdom because of his closeness to God the Father. Our families can also be filled with wisdom, if we stay close to God. Ask your child what the word 'wisdom' means to them. Who do they know to be a wise person? What makes a person wise? It may help your child if you talk about someone who you know to be wise.



"We can ask the Lord to grant us the gift of wisdom." Pope Francis

Wisdom is a gift from God and helps us to see things more clearly and make the right choices in life. It's about using knowledge well - having good judgement. Each of you choose a way in which you will try to grow in God's wisdom throughout the coming year. Perhaps it is through: not rushing when making decisions; thinking before we speak; being open to correction; trying to consider what effect our words and actions might have on ourselves and others; reading the gospels together and listening carefully; praying to God for the gift of wisdom.

In the beginning was the Word: the Word was with God and the Word was God. Through him all things came to be, not one thing had its being but through him. All that came to be had life in him and that life was the light of all people, a light that shines in the dark, a light that darkness could not overpower. The Word was the true light that enlightens all people; and he was coming into the world. He was in the world and the world did not know him and his own people did not accept him. But to all who did accept him he gave power to become children of God, to all who believe in the name of him who was born of God himself. The Word was made flesh, he lived among us, and we saw his glory, the glory that is his as the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth.



From the Gospel of Sunday 2nd January 2022 John 1: 1-5. 9-14 (the 2nd Sunday after the Nativity)

Which words stood out for you in this Gospel, and why? What does the picture make you think about? Enjoy exploring this Wednesday's word, which is CHRIST.



Christ is the light who brightens the darkness. Let us ask Christ that our hearts become free and filled with light, so that we can rejoice as children of God." Pope Francis

The real point of Christmas is the birth of Jesus Christ. The Church reminds us that Christ is the Word who became flesh (he is both man and God) and he came to live among us. This is known as the 'incarnation'. Ask your child what they think the word 'Christ' means (parent help: the word 'Christ' means 'the anointed one', the one who is sent to save the world). Christ came to save us from doing wrong - to show us and to teach us how to live good lives. It may help your child if you share something that you know about Christ.



"Let's welcome the light of Christ into our hearts. When Christ is your friend, you have joy, serenity and happiness." Pope Francis

Jesus Christ is God's greatest gift to the world. His wonderful birth (and indeed his whole life, his death and his resurrection) gives witness to the fact that he is the Son of God. Christ, the 'Light of the World', came to enlighten us - to show us the way to God and to confirm our hope of heaven. He came to draw everyone into his love, so that we may joyfully share in God's own life. As a family, talk about ways that you can live and love more like Christ in 2022. Blessings and best wishes for the coming new year.

What was John the Baptist doing? In Church this Sunday we celebrate a special feast – the Baptism of the Lord. The new year presents an opportunity to remember, or to discover, the blessings received at Baptism. Ask your child what else they know about baptism. If your child has been baptised, do they know where they were baptised and who baptised them? Do they know their godparents? You might also like to share with your child any memories you have of their baptism and how you chose their name. Perhaps you have photographs to show them.

At Jesus' Baptism, the Holy Spirit came down on Jesus making him ready to begin his great work: to draw us all into his family so that we can become more like him and joyfully share in God's own life. How can we live more like Jesus as we begin this new year? Perhaps we can: always try to help around the home; remember to start each morning with a prayer and thank God for each new day and for each other; make a new start with church; as a family, resolve to support a charity in 2022; be peacemakers and try to make friends with someone we've fallen out with. You may like to choose something new to start together that will strengthen your family.
