Place the Ancient Greek civilisation in time and a conclusion about how life changed for the Anglo know how long it lasted. Saxons in the North East of England. Order significant events from the Ancient Greek civilisation on a timeline. Recognise that the power in Greece was divided between city states that were governed differently. Pupils will identify similarities/differences between Athens and Sparta and reach conclusions about where the power lay in Ancient Greece. Understand that the Ancient Greek religion was 'polytheistic' and say some ways that they worshipped different Gods and Goddesses, knowing that Greek beliefs gave way to Greek mythology. Recount the events that led to the invasion of Troy and recognise aspects of the story that may be fact/myth. Know where and how the Olympic Games originated and compare aspects of the ancient and modern- day games. Describe what happened at the Battle of Marathon and explain how Athens were victorious; explain the influence on today's

	modern marathon race.
