What helps us stay healthy?

Key Vocabulary

Key Learning

• Who helps us to stay healthy (e.g. parent, dentist, doctor).

- That things people put into or onto their bodies can affect how they feel.
- How medicines (including vaccinations and immunisations) can help people stay healthy and that some people need to take medicines every day to stay healthy
- Why hygiene is important and how simple hygiene routines can stop germs from being passed on
- What we can do to take care of ourselves on a daily basis, e.g. brushing teeth and hair, hand washing.

- During iMove, pupils will learn about 'Stop Motion' animation.
- They will gain a number of animating skills to create their own stop motion animations on an iPad.
- Pupils will have to create a plot and overcome the challenges involved in animating multiple objects and characters within each frame.

Songwriting with Glockenspiels L1

Key Vocabulary

- Pupils in year 1 will focus on how they can create sound with their bodies, their voice, and with instruments using ostinati.
- They will learn the difference between lyrics and instrumentals and investigate the sounds of different instruments before creating soundscapes.

- Pupils will learn about body percussion and begin composing using these sounds and the class will learn about graphic scores.
- Pupils will improvise question and answer phrases and link this with their compositional skills.

- Pupils will also begin to combine the use of animals, numbers and colours vocabulary.

Reminders and Homework

<u>Homework</u>

- Banded books will be changed on Mondays and Thursdays. Library books will be changed on a Monday only.
- Children are expected to read a minimum of three times a week to support their developing phonic knowledge.
- Children are also expected to practise reading and learning to spell the Year 1 common exception words (tricky words) at home. These are glued into the front of their reading records. As the year progresses, more words will be added in line with your child's ability to read and spell them.
- Children will have a two-sided weekly phonics homework to complete to help them recall the sounds they are learning each week.
- It is also beneficial for your children to practise counting in 2s, 5s and 10 at home. Purple Mash can be used to support your children with this. Their login for this website is glued into their reading records. We will be introducing a new times tables website soon to help them learn their 2, 5 and 10 times tables and to practise them online at home.
