Homework Reading Homework in Year 2 will consist of reading at least three times per week at home. Please can all parents/carers ensure that the school reading records are signed, dated and page numbers added, so that when following up in class, we know where the children are up to. The children will have the opportunity to change home reading books twice a week, on a Monday and a Thursday. Each child in class will also be sent home with a library book each week and this can also be changed every Thursday.				
<b>Spelling</b> For spelling this term, we will be following a weekly spelling programme, where every Monday, the class will be introduced to a specific spelling focus for the week. For the rest of the week, each day the class will complete spelling sessions, based on the specific focus for the week. We will then complete a spelling quiz on Friday.				
The class will receive a set of spellings every Monday, to take home and practice for the week. The spelling list will have a specific focus. I will also upload the spelling list onto class dojo every Monday, in case the children misplace spelling lists.
