Why do we have Remembrance Day?

Every year, in November, we celebrate Remembrance Day. On this day we remember all of the people that have fought and died in all of the terrible wars.

Over 100 years ago in 1914 was the start of the First World War when many countries fought with each other.



What is Remembrance Day?



4 years later on 11th November 1918, all of the countries finally agreed to stop fighting and the world became peaceful once again.







As a result, every year on 11th November we wear poppies to show that we remember all of the people that lost their lives during wars.

How do we remember?



Many people wear poppies to remember the people who died.

Wreaths are laid beside war memorials by people.
Lots of places hold a 2 minute silence at 11:00am to think about people who died.









Why do we wear a poppy?

In World War 1, a lot of the fighting was done in countries called France and Belgium. Lots of things were destroyed; buildings, roads and trees all vanished.





The men were fighting in large fields, but as they fought, all the ground turned to mud, where no grass or plants grew. Only 1 thing grew – poppies! When all the fighting had stopped these flowers grew all over the land that had been destroyed and made people happier.

The poppies grew every year, and reminded people about the war.

However, after 7 weeks, she was told she had to leave the job because her Dad was not from Britain.

At the start of World War 2, Britain had a 'colour bar' which meant that only white men could fight for Britain.

> How do you feel about this law?? `

They made a huge difference in the war, but were often treated poorly and paid less than British men. When Lilian heard that black men were serving in the forces, she applied again and got a job in the Women's Auxiliary Air Forc

When I got there I was the only coloured person in a sea of white faces. That was hard, but someone told me I looked smart in my uniform, which cheered me up no end.



Lilian worked as an instrument repairer. Women had never been allowed to do this job before, but in World War Two they showed they could do a whole variety of jobs really well.

> I had to check that everything in the planes worked perfectly. It was very hard work and long hours, but I was proud to be making a difference.
