Communication and Language

Key Vocabulary

New vocabulary will be used in conversation within this area. Please see other areas to see which new vocab will be used in conversations.

Key Learning

- Talk about familiar books
- Retell stories
- Learn rhymes, poems and songs
- Introduce the term non-fiction
- Learn new vocabulary

Literacy

Key Vocabulary

Other new vocabulary will be taught whilst reading key stories.

Maths

Key Vocabulary

Pattern, double, odd, even, compare, square, rectangle, triangle, circle, cube, sphere, cuboid

Key Learning

- explore symmetrical patterns, in which each side is a familiar pattern, linking this to 'doubles'.

- continue to consolidate their understanding of cardinality, working with larger numbers within 10
- become more familiar with the counting pattern beyond 20.
- explore the composition of odd and even numbers, looking at the 'shape' of these numbers
- begin to link even numbers to doubles
- begin to explore the composition of numbers within 10.
- compare numbers, reasoning about which is more, using both an understanding of the 'howmanyness' of a number, and its position in the number system
- Names of 3D shapes. Can describe similarities and differences.
- Building with 3D shapes.
- Patterns - more repetition – ABB AABB

Religious Education (R.E)

Understanding the World

Key Vocabulary

Pharmacy, environment, occupation, King, materials, healthy, unhealthy, ingredients, solid, liquid, smooth, rough, diet, vegetable, fruit

Key Learning

- Naming and observing the weather: *understand changes in the natural world including seasons*
- Muddy Monday: places in our local environment- shops, chemist, petrol station, school, park, nursery, church: *exploring our local environment using knowledge from observation, discussion and maps*
- Finding out about different occupations and their role in society: *to talk about the lives of people around them and their roles in society (communication, observe, research, recall)*
- King Charles: who is he?: *to understand the past through settings, characters and events (vocab, research, describe, chronology, communication)*
- Food (Know where food comes from, informed about healthy food choices, understand how animals are used for food production, say why measuring ingredients is important)
- Materials (State the names of different materials, describe materials using descriptive vocabulary, know where some materials come from, understand how some materials can change)

Reminders and Homework

PE

Please can children come to school in their PE kit every Monday and Friday. Please ensure that the children wear black joggers/leggings or black/navy shorts with their house PE t-shirt. Wellingtons and waterproofs need to be in school every Monday.
