Nursery – We are currently full in Nursery with a waiting list and in September, we have higher numbers than ever for the start of the year. So if your child is three now and does not have a place yet please contact school as we anticipate being full by Christmas, possibly earlier and you would then need to wait until September 2024.

Unfortunately, we do have a number of children who do not attend for all of their sessions, we are a school Nursery and not childcare and by not bringing your child regularly you are taking a place someone else could have. Because of this, we may have to take the decision to remove your child's place and give it to someone else. Attendance at our school Nursery is compulsory and if you want something more flexible please look at childcare options.

Head Lice - Head Lice are a common problem in school-aged children. They cannot be prevented, but regular checking ensures early detection and treatment if necessary. Parents and carers should check their children's head once a week during hair washing. You need your usual shampoo, conditioner, and a detection comb — ask your local pharmacist to recommend a suitable one. Remember that you are looking for living moving lice, which is the only evidence that your child is infected. If you find a living louse, sellotape it to a piece of light coloured paper and take it to your local pharmacy (Leeds only) who will advise you and can provide free Hedrin lotion under the Pharmacy First Minor Ailments Scheme. Combs are available from the office.

Weekly Round Up

Reception – This week in Reception, we have been storytellers! We have been retelling some of our favourite stories using puppets and props. We have been working on our sentence writing and have been working hard to remember our fingers spaces. In Maths, we have been sharing amounts into 2 groups. We have talked about odd and even numbers and what happens when we share them.

Year 1 & 2 – This week children in classes 3, 4 and 5 have investigated what makes a good history maker and have studied the lives of Queen Elizabeth I and Amelia Earhart. They have looked at the roles of these women in History and discussed what they achieved. In DT, children have tasted a variety of fruit to decide what ingredients they will choose for their fruit smoothies. Children in classes 6 and 7 have been exploring charts and graphs in Maths. They have constructed their own pictograms to represent data they have collected - such as eye colour and hair colour of the children in their class. In English, the children have sequenced their story - The adventures of Swashbuckle Lil. They are really enjoying the story about a pirate girl!

Year 3 & 4 - This week, Years 3 and 4 have enjoyed writing up a chapter of Macbeth in our own words. We were very excited during our trip to the West Yorkshire Playhouse, which helped us with this. Whilst there, we had a tour of the theatre and took part in a Macbeth workshop. In Science, we have been learning about sun safety, which seems very fitting with the lovely weather we have been having. We are also starting our Giacometti sculptures this week and have enjoyed our new Geography unit on sustainability, where we learned why people were not as sustainable in the past.

Year 5 & 6 - Trips - Both Years 5 and 6 will be on trips towards the end of this half term. Thank-you to all those families that have made a voluntary contribution. We would still really appreciate voluntary contributions from families who have not already contributed – if we do not receive enough voluntary contributions, we may need to cancel the trips.
