If they forget where they put them it is easier to find them if they have their name/class on them. We will keep checking in school and label them if we get the chance but if you could do this at home it would really help. Thank you.

Attendance - We are still seeing a high number of occasions when siblings are all off at the same time. We know they can be ill at the same time but it is not always the case. We appreciate it can be easier to keep all your children at home but only the ill child should be at home. Please ask school if you need any support on these occasions, we may be able to help.

The NHS guidance (below) says children should be in school if they have a common cold and cough. Unfortunately, these are very common at this time of year. They only need to stay at home if they have a high temperature and are unwell.

# Coughs and colds

It is fine to send your child to school with a minor <u>cough</u> or <u>common cold</u>. However, if they have a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes.

Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

Make sure your child comes to school every day and on time. By **8.40am for Nursery**, **12.30pm in the afternoon** and by **8.50am for the rest of school**.

Children being late has a negative impact on the child, the other children in the class and the staff.

#### **Weekly Round Up**

Nursery – It was a great week back after the half term break. Our topic this half term is called 'Animals Around the World'. This week we have been learning about jungle animals and our focus text has been 'Monkey Puzzle' by Julia Donaldson. We have learnt the names of animals and described them. We looked at different animal patterns and matched baby animals to their mummies. The children painted monkeys and practiced cutting skills while cutting out shapes and created the monkey bodies. In Maths, we have been counting out fruit and matching them to the right numeral. We have also practiced 2D shapes. In phonics, we continued rhyme activities and started looking at initial sounds in words.

**Reception** – This week in Reception, we have been looking at different places around the world. We spent time looking at atlases and globes and talking about how the land and sea is represented. We enjoyed singing the 'Continent Song' and talked about where we live. In drawing club, we listened to the story 'Lost and Found'; we have worked hard to draw the penguin and the boat from the story. We talked about where penguins live and compared hot and cold places.

Year 1 & 2 - Welcome back to a new school half term - we hope everyone had a lovely break.

Over the next half term, children in Year 1 will be learning the topic – Roots, Shoots and Muddy Boots. This topic will focus on farms, learning where food comes from and growing plants. There will be a visit to a farm in a few weeks' time - more details will be sent out in a couple of weeks. In Year 2, the children will be learning about cities in the UK, looking at London as the capital city and Leeds as their locality. They will be studying famous landmarks in these cities and understanding the Geography associated with large cities.

**Year 3 & 4** - This week, Years 3 and 4 have been starting to look at volcanoes and earthquakes as part of our new Geography topic. We have also been reading a non-fiction book about natural disasters in English. In PSHE, we have been looking at similarities and differences between ourselves and others, and looking at how we can celebrate being unique individuals. In PE, we will be doing basketball and netball this half term. In DT, we have started our new cookery topic and will be looking at healthy sandwich snacks over the half term.

**Year 5 & 6 – Lessons -** In English, we have started to read our new book, Holes – written by Louis Sachar. We started by looking at the front cover and blurb to infer and predict what the book might be about. In Geography, we looked at the structure of the Earth, including the Crust, Mantle and the Core. In Science, we have started our topic of 'Light' and talked about different light sources and how we see things. In DT, children have started their topic of 'Phone Holders.'

**Homework** - Children are expected to read their reading book at home every night. We also encourage children to use Reading Plus at home. Each week, children will be set homework the following on Emile: grammar, punctuation, spelling and Math's. Homework is set on a Monday and needs to be completed by the following Monday. There is a homework club every Monday and Thursday lunchtimes for any children wishing to complete their homework in school.
