**Something Mrs Wainwright has enjoyed this week has been** seeing the children take part in the Science week activities especially the animal workshops. Hands on activities are so exciting and help the children learn and remember.

Worship – Our current theme is <u>forgiveness</u> and this week we reflected on how people if they want to be forgiven for things they have done, need to be prepared to forgive others. Sometimes people forget that everyone at times need to be forgiven and need to learn to forgive others. We also reflected on our Big Question, 'Have you ever found forgiving someone very hard to do?' Forgiveness demonstrates the British Values of 'Tolerance', understanding people make mistakes and 'liberty', choosing to forgive someone.

**Milk** - We will be providing children in Years 1-6 with the opportunity to have milk in school for the summer term. Nursery and Reception children already receive it free of charge. For children entitled to benefit related free school meals this will be free but you must still complete a form for the summer

term requesting this for your child, for all others it must be ordered and paid for in advance for the term. The cost for the summer term will be £18.00. Forms can be collected from the office from Monday 17<sup>th</sup> March. All forms must be completed and returned to the office by Monday 31<sup>st</sup> March. Payments can be made by ParentPay or card at the office as we no longer accept cash in school. If you would like to pay by ParentPay, please call or message the office to let us know then we can add it to your account. We cannot accept late payments, as we need to order the milk in advance. Once this has been paid, we cannot provide refunds.



**Disconnect to Reconnect Week** - Next week we will be taking part in' Disconnect to Reconnect' week, which is aimed at raising awareness of the impact of excessive screen time on children's wellbeing. During this week, we will be encouraging pupils to reduce their device use and

reconnect with the world around them. We encourage you to support this campaign at home by discussing with your children ways that they can spend their free time and perhaps even try out some new activities with them. <u>Headlice</u> - Head Lice are a common problem in school-aged children. They cannot be prevented, but regular checking ensures early detection and treatment if necessary. Parents and carers should check their children's head once a week during hair washing. You need your usual shampoo, conditioner, and a detection comb – ask your local pharmacist to recommend a suitable one. Remember that you are looking for living moving lice, which is the only evidence that your child is infected. If you find a living louse, sellotape it to a piece of light coloured paper and take it to your local pharmacy (Leeds only) who will advise you and can provide free Hedrin lotion under the Pharmacy First Minor Ailments Scheme. Combs are available from the office.

#### **Weekly Round Up**

Nursery - This week our focussed text has been 'Dear Zoo'. We have learnt what a zoo is and what kind of animals we can find in zoos. The children built a zoo using construction blocks and made homes for animals using playdough. We made lots of animal masks and on Wednesday, we had a visit from zoo lab. We looked and learnt about four animals: snake, frog, stick insect and cockroach. The children were really brave and some even held or touched the animals. In phonics, we continued to learn the sound S and we went on an S word hunt.

Reception – This week in Reception, we have been learning about our wonderful world. We have listened to the story 'Little Red and the Very Hungry Lion' and talked about Africa comparing it to England, thinking about names, clothes, shops and climate. We have been learning which animals live in Africa and drawn some amazing pictures. We sorted animals into hot and cold environments. In Math's we have been comparing more and fewer.

Year 1 & 2 – In Science this week, Year 1 children have been identifying and naming the different parts of a plant. The children have looked at the daffodils that were planted earlier in the year in order to find features such as petals, roots, stems and leaves. They have also been observing the beans that they planted previously to see how much they have grown. In their Science lessons, Year 2 children have been learning about living things and their habitats. They have studied how animals are suited to the habitats they live in and have looked at those that live in an oak tree. Children thought how the features of animals such as squirrels, worms, moles and caterpillars enable them to thrive in a woodland habitat.

Year 3 & 4 - This week, Years 3 and 4 have enjoyed reading our new text in English, called 'Escape from Pompeii'. It is about a volcano that erupted in Italy many years ago and links with our Geography learning this half term. We have also been looking closer at New Zealand and investigating why they have so many earthquakes there. In Science, we have started our new topic about forces, and this week we have been looking at pushes and pulls. In RE, we have been looking at why Prophet Muhammad is an inspiration to Muslims.

Year 5 & 6 - Elland Road - Primary Choices Visits - We are still accepting voluntary contributions of up to £5 for the Elland Road visits starting next week. The voluntary contribution will have to be paid on card at the school office, or it can also be paid on Parent Pay. If you do not have Parent Pay and need help setting this up, please see/contact Mrs Busby in the school office.

Classes 15 and 16 will be visiting on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> March. Classes 12 and 13 will be visiting on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> March. Class 14 will be visiting on Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> March.

**Lessons** - In English, we are continuing to read Holes. We have discussed Chapter 20 and given our thoughts on the Warden and how she treats the children and Mr Sir. We have completed a visualization activity – visualizing what the inside of the warden's cabin looks like. In Music, we have continued to learn, rehearse and perform 'Let's Rock.'

**Homework** - Children have the opportunity to complete a variety of tasks set for the Spring Term — children have received a paper copy. We have dedicated display space for children's work to be displayed and Trackit points will be awarded to children bringing in their work.
