- **DOGS-** Please remember all Leeds City Council sites do not allow dogs on site expect for guide dogs, this also includes carrying them.

<u>Headlice</u> - Head Lice are a common problem in school aged children. They can't be prevented, but regular checking ensures early detection and treatment if necessary. Parents and carers should check their children's head once a week during hair washing. You need your usual shampoo, conditioner, and a detection comb – ask your local pharmacist to recommend a suitable one. Remember that you are looking for living moving lice, which is the only evidence that your child is infected. If you find a living louse, sellotape it to a piece of light coloured paper and take it to your local pharmacy (Leeds only) who will advise you and can provide free Hedrin lotion under the Pharmacy First Minor Ailments Scheme. Combs are available from the office.

My Health My School Survey - Pupils in KS2 will be taking part in the My Health My School survey next week. Parents will have received a letter to give consent to your child taking part in this. The survey is anonymous and does not ask for the children's names or any personal details. The results that are given in the survey help us to ensure that our PSHE curriculum meets the needs of our children and that we can provide any more information about any topics that children would like to learn more about.

Nursery Places – We have Nursery places available, if you have a child who is currently 3 years old or turning 3 between now and July 2026, please register them at the office in advance and we will contact you nearer the time they turn 3. If you need any further information, please see Mrs Drake.

Weekly Round Up

Nursery – This week we have continued to read the 'Brown Bear, Brown Bear' book. We have drawn our favourite animal and made a chart to see which animal had the most votes. In Maths we looked at positional language. We learnt words like: on, in, behind, under, and in front of, and we used the language in practical activities during play. We continue to learn songs and Makaton signs for our concert. During our mark-making sessions we practised tracing. The children did amazingly when tracing over the lines.

Reception – This week in Reception we have been talking about Birthdays and the traditions people use to celebrate their birthday such as giving a cake, sharing gifts and having a party. We enjoyed celebrating our class bear 5th Birthday and threw them a little party with balloons, cards and a game of musical statues. We have enjoyed listening to the story Little Red, a twisted tale and have used our talk token to say if we liked the story. In Maths we have been comparing more and fewer. We are working hard to learn our Christmas Concert.

Year 1 & 2- This week both Year 1 and Year 2 children have been learning about keeping safe in PSHE. They have looked at times we would call 999 and the different emergency services that are available to help us. Children were given different scenarios and thought about which service they would need - fire, ambulance or police. We have also been visited this week by the local PCSO who came to talk to the children about their job and what they do. Children were really interested and asked some fantastic questions.

Year 3 & 4 — This week, Year 3 have enjoyed their trip to the Coal Mining Museum. We took part in a workshop about rocks and soils and enjoyed a tour of the museum. In lessons, we have been comparing creation stories in RE from a range of religions. In Geography, we have been learning why Milton Keynes grew so rapidly. In English, we have enjoyed creating our own villains to form part of our fairy tales.

This week, Year 4 have been looking at how to build suspense in spooky stories, looking at how short sentences and punctuation can support this. In Geography, we have been looking at how WW2 impacted Leeds. In PSHE, we have looked at alcohol and how it can change our bodies. In RE, we have been looking at the 'golden rule' and how we can be kind to others.

Year 5 & 6 – Lessons: We enjoyed visiting Kirkstall Abbey at the start of the week – looking at the Abbey and its surroundings – we imagined how we could incorporate the Abbey into our scary stories. In Geography, we held a debate about the Three Gorges Dam. In Science, we looked into the effects of air resistance – designing different parachutes and investigating different levels of air resistance.

We are always trying to make things as easy and affordable as possible for parents and try to listen to what you say. We are reviewing our uniform policy for the summer term and want your views.

Having a uniform is very important for a school, it creates a sense of belonging and ensures all children feel the same and equal. It helps parents with the arguments about what the children are going to wear (at least on a school day).

The government have issued new guidance to schools but luckily we already have in place all their recommendations.

We are looking at introducing the option of children wearing a plain red t-shirt instead of a polo shirt. This is

following some discussions with parents and our commitment to making our uniform as simple and affordable as possible. It would be cooler in the summer months and possibly cheaper.
