	Developing a <b>strong grounding in number</b> is essential so that all children develop the necessary <b>building blocks</b> to excel mathematically. Children should be able to <b>count confidently</b> , develop a deep understanding of the <b>numbers to 10</b> , the <b>relationships between</b> them and the patterns within those numbers. By providing frequent and varied opportunities to build and					
Educational	apply this understanding - such as using <b>manipulatives</b> , including small pebbles and tens frames for organising counting - children will develop a secure base of knowledge and vocabulary
