First Reading: Isaiah 43:16-21

'Behold, I am doing a new thing and I will give drink to my chosen people.'

Thus says the Lord, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, who brings forth chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick: 'Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old.

Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. The wild beasts will honour me, the jackals and the ostriches, for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, the people whom I formed for myself that they might declare my praise.

Response: What great deeds the Lord worked for us!

Indeed, we were glad.

Second Reading: Philippians 3:8-14

'For the sake of Christ I have suffered the loss of all things, becoming like him in his death.'

Brothers and Sisters: I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith — that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Brothers and sisters, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel Acclamation:

Glory to you, O Christ, Son of the living God. Even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, for I am gracious and merciful. Glory to you, O Christ, Son of the living God.

Gospel Reading John 8:1-11

'Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her.'

At that time: Jesus went to the Mount of Olives. Early in the morning he came again to the temple. All the people came to him, and he sat down and taught them. The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery, and placing her in the midst they said to him, 'Teacher, this woman has been caught in the act of adultery. Now in the Law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?' This they said to test him, that they might have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground. And as they continued to ask him, he stood up and said to them, 'Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her.' And once more he bent down and wrote on the ground. But when they heard it, they went away one by one, beginning with the older ones, and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. Jesus stood up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' She said, 'No one, Lord.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you; go, and from now on sin no more.'

REFLECTION

The call in Lent is to reconciliation and to change. In today's first reading we are reminded of the great blessings we receive from the Sacrament of Reconciliation; we are urged "Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old". We need to believe we can be forgiven. God promises that he will provide a new thing, a way in the wilderness, that all we need to do is open our eyes to perceive it. He will take us from the wilderness of our lives and create a new road for us to follow.

Paul is making a journey from obedience to the Law and living as a devout Jew to living as a Christian and following a crucified Christ. This is not an easy choice, it is a difficult road to follow but Paul says "I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord". He realises that he does not walk alone, that without the guidance of the Spirit and his faith in the resurrection of Jesus he would not be able to walk this road. But he tries, just like an athlete; he strives for the finishing line. Paul speaks to from the heart; this is a personal testimony in which he accepts that he can only do this with the help of Christ.

The Gospel is also speaking about our attitude to others who we judge as sinners. This time it is a woman who is in trouble: as an adulterer she is under sentence of death by stoning; a cruel punishment in a male dominated society. The Jews use this as a test against Jesus, hoping to trap him into an indiscretion. Jesus sees through their motives he says a few words then turns his attention to marks he is making in the sand. The mob is challenged by the words of Jesus "Let him who is without sin throw the first stone at her" and one by one they walk away unable to face their own sins. Often, we judge others; we apply to them rules which we do not apply to ourselves. We need to learn to hate the sin but love the sinner. Change is always necessary; real change makes a difference in our lives, and this is the change that Jesus wants us, and the woman taken in adultery to make.


because we are sinners too.
