Key learning linked to Geographical development

<u>Communication:</u> talk about the features of different places (familiar /other places, talk about patterns and change in relation to places with which they are familiar

Mapping: know about features of different places, recognise and talk about the features in familiar/other places.

<u>Fieldwork: look</u> closely at similarities and differences between different places, (familiar/other places) make simple comparisons

Enquiry: comment and ask questions about familiar places/other places, and about familiar/other people.

Use of Technology: use technology and IT equipment) eg, camera, IPad, video clips, apps, visualisers or the internet) to make observations or find information about different locations or place.
