Individuals at Risk	School staff, pupils, families/attendees, the people they live with and their other close contacts, vulnerable children (as classified by DfE or LA guidance or school), vulnerable adults, anyone who is Black, Asian, Minority Ethnic (BAME), young/ inexperienced workers, new/ expectant mothers, anyone experiencing ill-health or who has pre-existing medical conditions.									
Risks	Covid-19 or the novel coronavirus (Covid-19) is a new, highly infectious and serious respiratory illness that can cause death, critical illness, and other serious and potentially long-term health complications we are still learning about. The virus can be transmitted by contact with a bodily fluid containing it, most commonly saliva droplets dispersed into the air (aerosols) through talking, coughing, sneezing, and the performance of some healthcare tasks, which are then breathed in by other people nearby or the droplets land on surfaces that others touch, getting into their body when they then touch their face, especially their own mouth, nose and eyes. This may lead to anxiety and other wellbeing issues amongst staff, pupils and parents. Risks arising from lack of building/equipment maintenance particularly during periods of partial or full closure. The ability to effectively implement fire and other emergency procedures may be compromised due to reduced staff numbers for example.									

This Risk Assessment cannot be read in isolation and must be read in conjunction with the setting's more comprehensive Covid-19 Risk Assessment(s) (see KAHSC model School Operations during Covid-19 Risk Assessment) along with Schools coronavirus (COVID-19) operational guidance, Actions for early years and childcare providers during the COVID-19 pandemic, SEND and specialist settings: additional COVID-19 operational guidance and Covid-19: Actions for Out of School settings along with the school's existing 'Performances/Stage Use' and 'Fire' Risk Assessment(s) and Performance/Event Evacuation Plan.

The risk assessment must also be read in conjunction with the Cumbria Education Infection Prevention Control (EIPC) team's Advice for Christmas events in educational settings in Cumbria produced to support educational settings in decision making about events which was adapted from draft guidance developed in Greater Manchester and provided by the Schools Taskforce group in the North West.

National (and Cumbria Public Health guidance) remains unchanged - Educational settings can plan and hold Christmas events such as nativities, carol services and trips. There is no need to cancel events at this time as a result of national Omicron guidance issued on the 29 & 30/11/21. With sufficient mitigation, events should be able to go ahead unless a setting is experiencing an outbreak of Covid-19 in a relevant class/year group or there are local restrictions in the community following public health advice. A risk assessment should be completed for each event that details the safety measures to be implemented. Considerations when weighing the balance of benefit and risk associated with an event should include:

- the educational, wellbeing and community benefit of the event;
- the perceived importance of an event within the school and wider community;
- current public health advice in your school and its locality;
- the risk of any cases occurring, resulting in the need to self-isolate for pupils, staff, parents, and others;
- the risk that self-isolation results in staff absence with consequential business continuity challenges and a further loss of face-to-face teaching time.

Risk assessments should be kept under review and updated accordingly if the number of active Covid-19 cases within a setting changes.

Inadequate control measures in place to reduce infection spread	High		When planning indoor or outdoor face-to-face performances, sporting or other organised events in front of a live audience, we will follow the latest advice in the <a href="COVID-19">COVID-19</a> : Organised events guidance, which provides details of how to manage audiences as well as carry out performing arts safely.  If an external venue is being used, it is good practice to swap risk assessments, so everyone is aware of who is responsible for which measures.

			<b>Ventilation:</b> We will hold events in large, well-ventilated spaces. Ventilation is particularly important for any activities that encourage greater aerosol transmission e.g., singing and playing wind instruments. This can be natural ventilation (opening windows, doors and vents), mechanical ventilation (fans and ducts), or a combination of both. It is particularly important to keep toilets	Performances will be held in the school hall with all windows open.	
			well-ventilated, as these can be areas of higher risk. We will consider using $CO_2$ monitors to assess whether there is sufficient ventilation in our venue. If we identify that ventilation is poor, we will take steps to improve fresh air flow. If we cannot increase the supply of fresh air, we will consider whether we can reduce the number of people in our venue.	O2 monitors will be placed in the hall and the readings will be monitored.	
			Space: We will encourage social distancing e.g.		
			<ul> <li>splitting the performance over two nights and allow more space between seating;</li> <li>staggering entrance and exit times;</li> <li>arranging seating to avoid unnecessary close contact between groups of children or different households who don't normally mix;</li> <li>where applicable, we will consider dividing the venue into zones so that attendees can be managed in smaller groups to reduce mixing. This could include using floor markings or temporary barriers and controlling the flow and numbers of attendees in each zone e.g. each</li> </ul>	Two members of a household will attend per child and will be distanced from other families.	
			<ul> <li>group of attendees could use separate entrances/exits, toilets and seating areas.</li> <li>we will ensure there is at least 2 (if not 3) metres between the children performing at the front and those on the front row;</li> <li>crowd queue management when entering/exiting the site - using one-way systems for entering and exiting spaces and the use of 'school stewards' to marshal this;</li> <li>eliminating pinch points where crowding may occur – particularly consider queueing for toilet facilities if these are available to attendees;</li> <li>advise attendees to leave the venue promptly and not gather in groups;</li> <li>ensure that any parent(s) waiting to collect their child remain seated until the child is ready;</li> <li>using a ticketing or booking system to manage numbers.</li> </ul>	Clear signage/instructions should be displayed	

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		<b>Contact tracing:</b> We may need to contact individuals after the event to warn and inform them of contact with positive cases, so we will keep an attendance list and will 'zone' seating, so we have a better idea of who has sat where.	Display the NHS QR code poster. Refer also Maintaining records to support NHS Test & Trace	
		<b>Face coverings:</b> The use of face coverings will be encouraged wherever possible (unless <u>exempt</u> ) if the event is indoors, and spaces are likely to be crowded.	Face coverings will be expected to be worn throughout the performance.	
		<b>Symptoms:</b> We will remind individuals not to attend if they have <u>COVID-19 symptoms</u> (or feel generally unwell/ have other symptoms if advised by the EIPC team).		
		<b>Testing:</b> In advance of the event we will recommend Lateral Flow testing to attendees where appropriate. <i>Note: that this cannot be enforced/checked on arrival, and is unlikely to be applicable to primary-age pupils.</i>		
		<b>Household contacts of positive cases</b> : We will ask attendees not to come if someone in their household tests positive for Covid-19 within 10 days of the event.	Hand sanitiser will be available to use on entry.	
		<b>Hands:</b> We will ensure hand sanitiser is available (particularly at entrance/exit doors) and encourage frequent use of hand sanitiser and handwashing.		
		Cleaning before and after the event: We will pay particular attention to high touch point areas, and clean these regularly (light switches, door handles, toilet areas) and before and after the event.		
		<b>Transport</b> : Due to the confined nature of transport and proximity of passengers, any transport arranged as part of the event is likely to be high risk:		
		<ul> <li>we will encourage the use of face coverings and open windows;</li> <li>if a coach has non-opening windows, consider stopping every 30 minutes and opening the doors to let fresh air circulate;</li> <li>we will keep a note of who is sat where.</li> </ul>		
		<b>Communications</b> : We will communicate with event attendees prior to the event to remind them of the Covid-safe measures we would encourage them to take. We will include the following type of message in any communications prior to the event:		
		'Please be aware that the safety of our students, staff and wider school community is of the upmost importance to us, therefore we may have to change or cancel the event at short notice if we are advised to do so by public health'.
