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What is the PE and sport premium for primary schools?

The primary PE and sport premium was introduced in March 2013 to improve the provision of physical education and school sport in primary schools across England. The £150 million per year funding is provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health, and Culture, Media and Sport (DfE, DH, DCMS). The money has been allocated directly to primary schools and we can choose how we use the funding, for example:

1. Hire specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers during PE lessons.
2. Support and involve the least active children by running after-school sports clubs and holiday clubs.
3. Provide resources and training courses in PE and sport for teachers.
4. Run sport competitions or increase pupils' participation in the School Games.
5. Run sports activities with other schools.

The National Curriculum aims are for all children:

- To be physically active, working towards a target of 30 minutes activity during and after the school day (excluding general play times)
- To excel in a broad range of activities
- To engage in competition
- To lead healthy lifestyles
- To be competent in swimming and water safety by the end of KS2

We have used the Sport Premium funding to help us achieve national curriculum requirements by:

- Offering a broad range of sport and activity in both PE and after school clubs
- Staff completing relevant training to increase confidence and competence in the delivery and assessment of PE
- Allowing children to take part in a range of competitive opportunities
- Paying for transport to and from events, competitions and swimming lessons
- Employing specialist coaches and visitors to come into school and deliver engaging and inspiring sessions throughout the school
- Supplying children with swimming lessons in both Key Stage 1 and 2

<u>2025/26 Action Plan</u>	
If children are not on track to meet the National Curriculum requirements by the end of year 6	KS2 to attend one week of intense swimming lessons in the Autumn term. KS1 to attend in the spring term and any KS2 children not yet meeting curriculum requirements.
If children are meeting the National Curriculum requirements before the end of year 6	Children in year 6 to attend Whitehaven Youth Harbour project, where they swim in open water and further increase their knowledge and skills regarding wild swimming safety.

1. Hiring specialist coaches to work with primary teachers during PE lessons
