To develop their small motor skills so that they can use a range of tools competently, safely and confidently. Such as pencils for drawing and writing, paintbrushes, scissors, knives, forks and spoons. To use a comfortable grip with good control when holding pens and pencils. To begin to form recognisable letters and show a preference for a dominant hand. To be increasingly independent as they get dressed and undressed, for example, putting coats on and doing up zips. To be increasingly independent in meeting their own care needs, e.g. brushing teeth, using the toilet, washing and drying their hands thoroughly. To confidently and safely use a range of large and small apparatus indoors and outside, alone and in a group. To develop confidence, competence, precision and accuracy when engaging in activities that involve a ball. To further develop the skills they need to manage the school day successfully: - lining up and queuing - mealtimes - personal hygiene.	To progress towards a more fluent style of moving, with developing control and grace. To develop their pronunciation. To be able to express a point of view and to debate when they disagree with an adult or a friend, using words as well as actions.	To learn and use new vocabulary. To use new vocabulary through the day. To articulate their ideas and thoughts in well-formed sentences. To ask questions to find out more and to check they understand what has been said to them. To connect one idea or action to another using a range of connectives. To describe events in some detail. To use talk to help work out problems and organise thinking and activities, and to explain how things work and why they might happen.	To listen attentively and respond to what they hear with relevant questions, comments and actions when being read to and during whole class discussions and small group interactions. To make comments about what they have heard and ask questions to clarify their understanding. To hold conversation when engaged in back-and-forth exchanges with their teacher and peers. To participate in small group, class and one-to-one discussions, offering their own ideas, using recently introduced vocabulary.

4 specific areas of learning and development	Reading and Writing	To understand the five key concepts about print: - print has meaning - print can have different purposes - we read English text from left to right and from top to bottom - the names of the different parts of a book - page sequencing. To develop their phonological awareness, so that they can: - spot and suggest rhymes - count or clap syllables in a word - recognise words with the same initial sound, such as money and mother. To engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary. To use some of their print and letter knowledge in their early writing. To recognise and write some of their name. To write some letters accurately. To read individual letters by saying the sounds for them. To blend sounds into words, so that they can read short words made up of known letter- sound correspondences. To read a few common exception words matched to the school's phonic programme. To form lower-case and capital letters correctly.	To read some letter groups that each represent one sound and say sounds for them such as 'ff', 'll', 'ss', 'zz', 'sh', 'ch', 'th', 'ck', 'wh', 'ng', 'qu.' To read simple phrases and sentences made up of words with known letter-sound correspondences and, where necessary, a few exception words. To re-read these books to build up their confidence in word reading, their fluency and their understanding and enjoyment. To spell words by identifying the sounds and then writing the sound with letter/s. To write short sentences with words with known sound-letter correspondences using a capital letter and full stop. To re-read what they have written to check that it makes sense.	Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary. Anticipate – where appropriate – key events in stories. Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems and during role-play. Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs. Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending. Read aloud simple sentences and books that are consistent with their phonic knowledge, including some common exception words. Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed. Spell words by identifying sounds in them and representing the sounds with a letter or letters. Write simple phrases and sentences that can be read by others.
	Mathematics	To count objects, actions and sounds. To subitise (recognise quantities without counting). To link the number symbol (numeral) with its cardinal number value. To recite numbers and count beyond ten. To compare numbers. To select, rotate and manipulate shapes in order to develop spatial reasoning skills. To solve real world mathematical problems with numbers up to 5. To compare quantities using language: 'more than', 'fewer than'. To talk about and explore 2D and 3D shapes (for example, circles, rectangles, triangles and cuboids) using informal and mathematical language: 'sides', 'corners'; 'straight', 'flat', 'round'. To understand position through words alone – for example, "The bag is under the table," – with no pointing. To describe a familiar route. To discuss routes and locations, using words like 'in front of' and 'behind'. To talk about and identify the patterns around them. For example: stripes on clothes, designs on rugs and wallpaper. To begin to describe a sequence of events, real or fictional, using words such as 'first', 'then...'	To understand the 'one more than/one less than' relationship between consecutive numbers. To explore the composition of numbers to 10. To automatically recall number bonds for numbers 0-10. To compose and decompose shapes so that children recognise a shape can have other shapes within it, just as numbers can. To select shapes appropriately: flat surfaces for building, a triangular prism for a roof etc. To combine shapes to make new ones – an arch, a bigger triangle etc. To continue, copy and create repeating patterns. To compare length, weight and capacity.	Have a deep understanding of number to 10, including the composition of each number. Subitise (recognise quantities without counting) up to 5. Automatically recall (without reference to rhymes, counting or other aids) number bonds up to 5 (including subtraction facts) and some number bonds to 10, including double facts. Verbally count beyond 20, recognising the pattern of the counting system. Compare quantities up to 10 in different contexts, recognising when one quantity is greater than, less than or the same as the other quantity. Explore and represent patterns within numbers up to 10, including evens and odds, double facts and how quantities can be distributed equally.
	Understanding the world	To talk about what they see, using a wide vocabulary. To begin to make sense of their own life-story and family's history. To show interest in different occupations.
