Headteacher's Update

Thank you so much to those of you who are testing your children at home. Testing them and ensuring they don't attend school if they are positive ensures the infection rates at school are reduced and most students can continue attending. The isolation period for those who have tested positive continues to change and we will keep you informed if you contact us with a positive case of what that means in terms of time frames.

The vast majority of students have made an excellent return to school after Christmas. We do have some new rules which have been implemented and everyone has adjusted to them extremely well. Many staff and students have given us very positive feedback on the changes we have introduced. We will continue to look to improve everything as we strive to be the best that we can be.

We fully intend to continue face-to-face education for all students but I recognise that the high rates of COVID-19 may cause difficulties with the availability of staff. If it were to become difficult to maintain the safety of all students in school, due to lack of available staff and adequate supervision, we may have to move to remote learning for some students for short periods of time. This will only ever be implemented as a very last resort and will only be for short periods of time until staffing numbers return to safe operational levels.

As a community we will continue to work together to ensure the students, your children get the best and safest possible education. Working together I am sure we can ensure everyone has a successful term and year.

Year 11 Mock Examinations

Remote Learning

- If there is a need for remote learning, we will use Microsoft Teams.
- All students in Years 8-11 will have a remote learning "how to" refresh with their form tutors on the use of Microsoft Teams.
- Year 7 students will have the opportunity to use MS Teams in school to ensure they are confident in using this should they need to access remote learning.

Development of a whole school reading strategy.

- In September, our English department launched a Reading for Pleasure with KS3 to try and enhance students' interest in reading for pleasure. Alongside this, our literacy coordinator Mrs Barton launched reading strategies in form time. Once per week, form tutors have led students through a topical article and a series of activities designed to develop students' vocabulary, inference skills and their ability to discuss topical issues.
- To build upon this, in January 2022, we launched our very own St Cuthbert's Reading Canon. The main purposes were: to further develop students' reading skills, to encourage the pleasure of reading, to expose students to some pertinent topical issues and to develop their cultural capital. The books were chosen after careful consideration following a combination of student, staff and PiXL recommendations... many were pre-read by fellow St Cuthbert's students to ensure that they were suitably stimulating. Also, our reading canon utilises high quality texts with a range of themes, writing styles and settings.
- The books will be read with form tutors; each form will read a minimum of twice per week.
- The books which we have chosen are:

Year 11	Saint Death – Marcus Sedgwick The Cost of Knowing – Britney Morris Tamar – Mal Peet

- You can support this initiative as parents by discussing the book with your child (ask them which book they are reading first; what they enjoy about their book; what their favourite characters, plots, or events are) or you could even read the book yourselves.

Year 11 Study Hub

Study hub is now up and running and in full flow. This allows students a quiet space for independent study. Teaching staff are timetabled into this room to support students with their learning. This is a great opportunity for our Year 11 students to start to get into good habits in preparation for their GCSE exams. After school homework clubs for other year groups are coming soon!

Proposed bus strike: Tuesday 18th & Thursday 20th January

We have been advised of planned strike action affecting First Manchester's Oldham Depot.

It is likely that strikes will take place next week on Tuesday (18th) and Thursday (20th).

TfGM has arranged alternative school bus services on all routes provided by First Manchester;

Coaches will follow their normal route and timetable and be provided by Olympic Travel or Viking Coaches. Fares will not be charged on strike days.
