



# Progression of Skills for Reading



## National Curriculum Aims and Objectives - Reading

The overarching aim for English in the national curriculum is to promote high standards of language and literacy by equipping pupils with a strong command of the spoken and written language, and to develop their love of literature through widespread reading for enjoyment. The national curriculum for reading aims to ensure that all pupils:

- reading easily, fluently and with good understanding
- develop the habit of reading widely and often, for both pleasure and information
- acquire a wide vocabulary, an understanding of grammar and knowledge of linguistic conventions for reading • appreciate our rich and varied literary heritage

Poetry and Performance

knowing that information can be relayed in the form of print

- knowing that information can be retrieved from books and computers

Recite simple poems by heart.

Continue to build up a repertoire of poems learnt by heart, appreciating these and reciting some with appropriate intonation to make the meaning clear.

Prepare and perform poems and play scripts that show some awareness of the audience when reading aloud.

Begin to use appropriate intonation and volume when reading aloud.

Recognise and discuss some different forms of poetry (e.g. free verse or narrative poetry).

Prepare and perform poems and play scripts with appropriate techniques (intonation, tone, volume and action) to show awareness of the audience when reading aloud.

Continually show an awareness of audience when reading out loud using intonation, tone, volume and action.

Confidently perform texts (including poems learnt by heart) using a wide range of devices to engage the audience and for effect.
