Early Years Foundation Stage (Birth–5)

- Prime learning area: Communication & Language is at the core of EYFS, influencing children's development in all other areas.

- Ask probing questions to deepen understanding and curiosity.

- Use diverse vocabulary strategies, including explicit teaching to enrich expression.
- Articulate and justify opinions, with structured arguments and narratives.
- Engage in collaborative discussions, staying on topic and extending others' ideas.
- Speculate, hypothesise, and imagine to explore ideas verbally.
- Speak audibly and fluently in increasingly sophisticated forms of Standard English.
