In the meeting I showed you the Letters and Sounds document that I follow. The Jolly Phonics teaching scheme teaches the children some different digraphs you see. If you look on the Letters and Sounds link on the school website, it will have the digraphs and trigraphs that will be taught to your child in phonics (resource section for Phase 2 and 3)

I have made up some of my own actions:

ear - grab ear and move gently

ure - Pretend that we can smell manure (they find it amusing) by moving our hand in front of our nose

air - move our hands gently in the air

ur - is the same action as Jolly Phonics action for /er/
