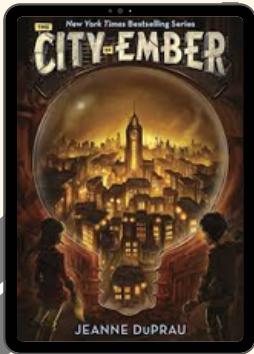


SCIENCE FICTION
Travel through space and time. Explore strange worlds. Will technology free us—or control us?



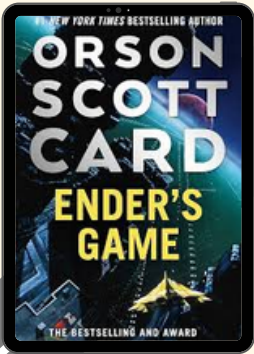
The City of Ember by Jeanne DuPrau

A dying city. Two children search for the light.



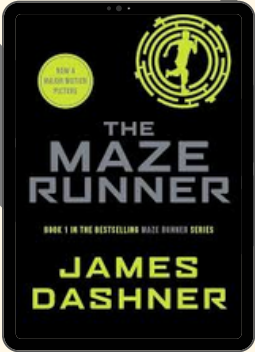
Ender's Game by Orson Scott Card

Wiped memories. Deadly maze. Answers lie beyond the walls.



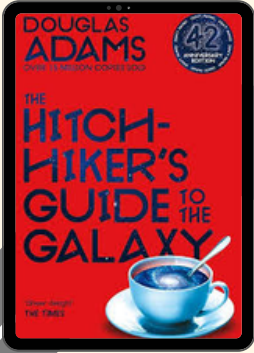
A Wrinkle in Time by Madeleine L'Engle

Time folds. Evil spreads. Can love save the universe?



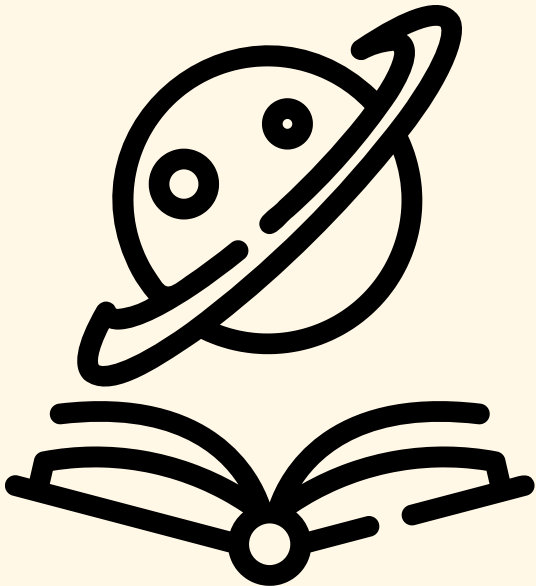
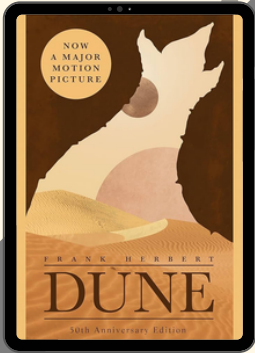

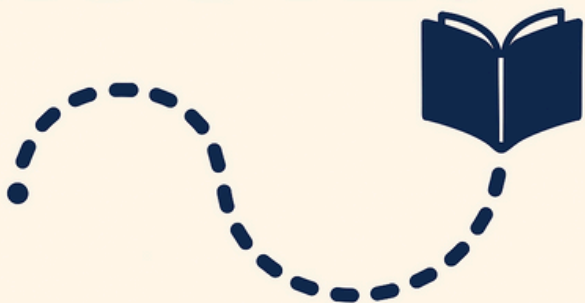


Dune by Frank Herbert
