


Good news brings new life.

Read "Lost and Found" by Oliver Jeffers, or watching this video of the story:



Pentecost



Pentecost is a Greek word, meaning "fiftieth day." At this time, Jewish people celebrate Shavuot and in Jesus' time there would have been a lot of people in Jerusalem. Read the Scripture on the next 4 slides, from Chapter 2 of the Acts of the Apostles, which describe how the Holy Spirit came upon the apostles and Mary.

Questions to discuss:

- What happened to the friends of Jesus?
- How would this help people spread the Good News?
- What reaction did the people have who heard Peter speak?
 - What effect did it have on their lives?
 - How would you have felt on hearing Peter's message?
- How does the power of the Holy Spirit change people's lives?
 - · How could you be bearers of Good News?

Your task:

Create your own artwork or storyboard, describing the events of Pentecost. Think about the colours and symbols you use in your artwork to show the effect of the Holy Spirit.

Then Peter stood up with the other apostles and in a loud voice began to speak to the crowd:

'Fellow Jews and all of you who live in Jerusalem, listen to me and let me tell you what this means. this is what the prophet Joel spoke about:

'Yes, even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my spirit in those days, and they will proclaim my message.'

Listen to these words, fellow Israelites!

Jesus of Nazareth was a man whose divine authority was clearly proven to you by all the miracles and wonders which God performed through him.

You yourselves know this, for it happened here among you.

In accordance with his own plan, God had already decided that Jesus would be handed over to be crucified.

All the people of Israel, then, are to know for sure that this Jesus, whom you crucified, is the one that God has made lord and messiah!


When the people heard this, they were deeply troubled and said to Peter and the other apostles, 'What shall we do, brothers?'

Peter said to them, 'Each one of you must turn away from your sins and be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ, so that your sins will be forgiven; and you will receive God's gift, the holy spirit.

For God's promise was made to you and your children, and to all who are far away - all whom the Lord our God calls to himself'.

Many of them believed his message and were baptised, and about three thousand people were added to the group that day.

They spent their time in learning from the apostles, taking part in the fellowship, and sharing in the fellowship meals and the prayers.



When the day of Pentecost came, all the believers were gathered together in one place.

Suddenly there was a noise from the sky which sounded like a strong wind blowing, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting.

Then they saw what looked like tongues of fire which spread out and touched each person there.

They were all filled with the holy spirit and began to talk in other languages, as the spirit enabled them to speak.

There were Jews living in Jerusalem, religious people who had come from every country in the world.

When they heard this noise, a large crowd gathered.


They were all excited, because all of them heard the believers talking in their own languages.

In amazement and wonder they exclaimed, 'These people who are talking like this are Galileans! How is it, then, that all of us hear them speaking in our own native languages?

We are from Parthia, Media, and Elam; from Mesopotamia, Judea, and Cappadocia; from Pontus and Asia; from Phrygia and Pamphylia, from Egypt and the regions of Libya near Cyrene.

Some of us are from Rome, both Jews and Gentiles converted to Judaism, and some of us are from Crete and Arabia

Yet all of us hear them speaking in our own languages about the great things that God has done!'



Questions to discuss:

- What happened to Philip on the way to Gaza?
 - How did Philip help the Ethiopian?
- What do you think the Ethiopian meant when he said he needed help to read the Bible?
 - Why did the Ethiopian want to be baptized?
 - How did the Ethiopian feel then?

Your task:

Imagine you are the Ethiopian. Write a letter to the Queen of Ethiopia to describe what happened when you met Philip. Try to explain how this meeting gave you new life.

Philip was a follower of Jesus. One day he went walking on the desert road from Jerusalem to Gaza.

A chariot passed him. In it was an officer of the court of the Queen of Ethiopia.

This man was reading one of the books of the Bible: the book of the prophet Isaiah.

God's spirit spoke to Philip, saying, "Go to meet that chariot."

When he reached the chariot, Philip heard the Ethiopian reading the words of Isaiah:

"Do you understand what you are reading?" asked Philip.

"How can I understand unless I have someone to help me?" he replied. He asked Philip to help him.

"Come up here beside me," he said. Philip did as he asked


The Ethiopian said, "Who is this prophet talking about here?"

Philip explained that the passage was about Jesus and went on to tell him more of the Good News of Jesus.


A little further on they saw some water and the Ethiopian asked, "Is there anything to stop me being baptised?"

He stopped the chariot.
Philip went down with him into the water and baptised him, there and then.

The Ethiopian continued his journey rejoicing. Philip went on telling the Good News everywhere he went.



The story of Paul.

- Why did Paul think it was important for him to do this?


Your task:

Use the template on the following slide. Fill the body template of Saul with words to describe how he was before. Then, fill the template of Paul with words and sentences to describe how he had changed.


Paul was originally called Saul. He was a Jew who came from Tarsus. He grew up in a Jewish home. He was a Pharisee and did everything he could to be a good man. He kept every rule there was to keep, but he did not like the followers of Jesus. He did his best to wipe them out; however, God filled his mind and heart with the light of truth, and he recognised who Jesus was. He knew he owed everything to God's love. All he wanted to do was spread the Good News of that love all over the world. When he became a Christian his name was changed to Paul.

He travelled many thousands of miles, on foot, on horseback and by boat to spread the Good News, mainly to the Gentiles, the people who were not Jews. In every place, he told people about Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit. He explained the Good News that Jesus had come to bring — God loves everyone. He told them how Jesus had died and been raised to a new life by his Father in heaven and how the Holy Spirit helps people. He told them that Jesus wanted them to share this new life. When they asked him what they had to do to live this new life, he told them that they must believe and be baptised and try to live like Jesus, loving God and loving one another. They were to share their faith with one another, pray together and break bread together as Jesus had done with his friends at the Last Supper.

Pharisees were a distinct group within Judaism, who believed in both the written and oral tradition of the Torah (the first 5 books of the Old Testament) and were strict in their observance.



Paul spreads the Good News.



After he became a friend of Jesus, Paul travelled many thousands of miles to spread the Good News. Watch this video, which tells you about his journeys. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Hy4K1pP408Y Now read the extra information, discuss the questions and try the task.

Questions to discuss:

- What drove Paul to put his life in danger by such hazardous journeys?
- · How do you think people felt when Paul came to their city?
 - What do you think happened when he left?
 - What do you think it was that kept Paul going on his journeys for 30 years, even though it was hard?

Your task:

Look at the table on the slide following the map. Can you match the places Paul visited to the letters he wrote to them? Draw lines on the table or make your own chart to match them correctly.

Paul was a Jew and became one of the friends of Jesus. He travelled many thousands of miles on foot, on horseback and by boat to give the message to the Gentiles, the people who were not Jews. Paul wanted as many people as possible to hear about the Good News of the new life which Jesus brought. So, he travelled around to the towns surrounding the eastern Mediterranean Sea. The Acts of the Apostles tells about those journeys and what happened. He had many adventures during his journeys. He was shipwrecked and was imprisoned several times. Paul would start a Christian community in a town and then move on to another place. He would often write to the people of the town where the Christian community had been started, offering them advice and encouragement. Sometimes he sent one of his friends to help them.


This is a simple outline of Paul's journeys:

The First Journey: Began and ended in Antioch in Syria, and included Cyprus as well as Iconium, Lystra and Derbe.

The Second Journey: Also began and ended in Antioch and included Phrygia and Galatia, Philippi, Thessalonica, Athens, Corinth and Ephesus. It included Caesarea in Palestine, and probably Jerusalem. (Note there are two towns called Antioch one in Pisidia and one in Syria)


The Third Journey: Included Galatia, Phrygia and Ephesus, where Paul spent more than two years; then Macedonia, Greece, where he spent three months, Philippi, and a return to Caesarea and Jerusalem.

The Fourth Journey: Began from Caesarea where Paul was arrested, and on to Rome where he was to be tried because he was a Roman citizen. On the way he stopped on the islands of Crete, Malta and Sicily. He was shipwrecked on this journey, but he managed to get to Malta.
