




Our challenge this week is to explore making simple patterns and to explore more complex patterns.

Making simple patterns

Guidance

Children copy, continue and create their own simple repeating patterns. They focus on AB and ABC patterns. It is important to provide patterns with at least three full units of repeat. Encourage the children to say the pattern aloud as this helps them to identify the part which repeats and supports them to continue the pattern.

Now explore some more complex patterns.


More complex patterns

Guidance

Children continue to copy, continue and create patterns. They explore patterns which use items more than once in each repeat for example ABB, AAB, AABB, AABB. Again it is important that each pattern you model has at least three full units of repeat. The more units of repeat, the easier it is to identify and continue the pattern.

Encourage the children to say each pattern aloud and to create patterns around the edge of shapes as well as in straight lines.

Observation skills are essential for working scientifically. Go on a nature hunt and see if you can find the following:


Head to the woods on a summer's day and look out for...

Forest Elephant Facts

- Forest elephants are an elusive subspecies of African elephants and inhabit the densely wooded rainforests of west and central Africa.
- Forest elephants are smaller than savanna elephants.
- Their ears are more oval-shaped ears and their tusks are straighter and point downward (the tusks of savanna elephants curve outwards)
