Making Drawings Move

Drawings can be inspired by stories the children have read or a story and characters they have created themselves. You could also use the moving face and characters ideas to create stop motion films as well!

Sliding Drawings

You'll need paper, pencils, scissors and tape.

1. Make a drawing of a face on a sheet of paper. Miss out the eyes and mouth.

2. Using scissors, cut out the eyes and mouth areas.

3. On a separate piece of paper, cut two long strips – these will be attached to the back of your drawing to "carry" the eye and mouth strips.

5. Turn the drawing over. Attach the strips of paper to your drawing with tape, to carry your eye and mouth strips. Slot your eye and mouth slips in and ensure they can move freely.

6. Now you can move the strips from side to side to alter the expression and character of your drawing!
