

MATHEMATICS

A lot of maths in Nursery is taught incidentally through playing with the children and introducing language and concepts in the moment in real situations.

Number

We will be learning the numbers 3,4,5 and 6. We will learn to recognise the number digit, recognise the amount when we see it and begin to develop our understanding of number composition. Being able to subitise numbers is very important in early maths develop. You can find out more about subitising here: - <u>Subitising</u> | <u>numeracy</u> | early years - <u>BBC Bitesize</u>

<u>Shape</u>

Alongside the numbers 3,4 and 5, we will also introduce the children to shapes name: triangle, square, rectangle and pentagon.

Through practical activities we will introduce children to the vocabulary of:

<u>Height & Length</u> Capacity

<u>Capacin</u> Mass

Ideas to support your child

Sing a range of number songs at home. At school we will be singing a number or rhyme a week. These will be shared with you on class dojo.

Count in the park and at home. Help your child become secure saying numbers to 10 in order. Find ways to experience different amounts. E.g. play with eggs boxes with 6 spaces.

By the end of the term, we aim for pupils to be able to :

- Count to 6 confidently.
- Organise up to 6 objects in different ways.
- Subitise number 1,2,3 and begin to try 4 and 5.
- Recognise number digits 1, 2,3,4,5
- Begin to describe shapes.
- Use maths vocabulary to explore height, length, capacity and mass.

PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Our sessions will include discussions about: Created and Loved by God



Emotional Well-Being, children will learn about likes, dislikes and selfacceptance. They will learn from Freddy Teddy and his friends how to describe different feelings, both good and bad. Finally through a real world example, children will learn

that actions have consequences; that when we make mistakes we should say sorry and ask for forgiveness.

Ideas to support your child

Talk to your children about how they are feelinghappy, sad, worried, excited, tired, scared, angry.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

What are we learning?

Gross Motor Skills

Gross motor skills are abilities that let us do tasks that involve large muscles in our torso, legs and arms. They involve whole body movements. We use gross motor skills for all sorts of physical activities from running to playing in the park. We will be focussing on running, jumping and

climbing outside. We want our bodies to be fit and healthy so we will exercise every day swing to develop our large body muscles. We will practise catching balls and bean bags and con-



trolling hula hoops. We want to learn to walk, run and jump with confidence, avoiding obstacles in our paths and keeping ourselves and others safe.

Fine Motor Skills

Fine motor skills involve small muscles working with the brain and nervous system to control movements in areas such as hands, fingers, lips, tongue and eyes. Developing fine motor skills helps children to do things like eating, writing, manipulating objects and getting dressed.

What are we learning?

- To thread beads onto string, straws and pipe cleaners.
- To press, squeeze, pinch and mould play dough.
- To begin to write letters in our name.

Ideas to support your child

- Youtube 'EYFs Finger Gym' or 'EYFs dough dis-co' and try the activities at home.
- Go to the park. Play on the climbing frames and the monkey bars to help build the muscles in your arms.
- Have a race around the park. Run as fast as you can.

We will promote reading for pleasure by sharing a class story together every day, encouraging children to enjoy our reading area during independent choice sessions.
