- Can damage the well being of both genders
 Boys ability/permission to express emotions
 Girls self esteem / confidence
- Academic attainment and life prospects girls tend to do better in most measures of academic attainment but worse in terms of pay and leadership positions in later life.

- Women tend to be put off applying if there is about 10% of a job description they think they can't do
- Men will apply for jobs where is 10% of a job description they think they can do

What does research show about how to close attainment gender gaps?

- There is conflicting evidence about re-designing the curriculum to specifically appeal to either gender
- Where schools have taken different approaches for girls/boys it has been more successful where these were short, sharp, targeted interventions rather than permanent differences
- Where girls underperform in maths, the main cause is found to be confidence and self perception/esteem and/or a lack of exposure to some mathematical opportunities particularly to do with shape
- "Current research shows that the brains of boys and girls are more similar than their well-described behavioural differences would indicate. "(Lise Eliot 2012)
- "It's in schools where gender constructions are less accentuated that gender gaps tend to be smaller" (Francis and Skelton, 2008).

Are there practices which emphasise the differences between the genders rather than their similarities? Or reinforce stereotypes?

- In the language/ tone of voice used?
- Behaviours/ attributes praised or corrected?
- Roles/tasks assigned?
- Activities encouraged/ discouraged?
- Clothing chosen / rejected?
- Role models reading/ maths?
