Pupil Premium Funding

Pupil Premium was introduced by the Government in 2011 and is allocated to schools based upon the number of pupils who are or have been registered for free school meals at any point over the previous six years (known as Ever6) and for Looked After Children (LAC). The amount allocated for 2018/2019 equates to £1,320 per pupil and is to be used to raise the attainment of 'Ever6' pupils and close the gap between free school meal (FSM) and non-FSM pupils. At St John's CE Primary School we are committed to making every penny of the Pupil Premium count
