

What happens in the Early Years?

Lots of busy fun!

Children in Nursery and Reception have different planned learning experiences, e.g. circle time for

- Nursery;
- Maths,
- English, Sounds-Write (Phonics) lessons for Reception

We are a unit...

- Reception and Nursery work together - shared access to continuous provision and outdoor learning,
- shared enquiries with adapted approaches, shared adults (although we have different responsibilities and areas of expertise, we all get to know all of our learners and we are there for all our children).



Play, Play, Play!

Well planned indoor and outdoor play are key to the way in which young children learn with enjoyment and challenge.

- Play is purposeful and extends learning.
- Children in Early Years are challenged.
- We have fun and learn while we're doing it.

What is the difference between Nursery and Reception?

Reception is the second year of the Foundation Stage – it builds on what they have been doing at nursery / pre school or home and prepares them for learning in Key Stage 1.

During the course of the year the children become more independent learners.

At home:

- Learning the sounds in their name
- Initial sounds of words
- Spot the sound... (on packaging, street names, in stories)
- 'Say the sounds to hear the word.' – sounding out words for children to guess



How will Mathematics be taught?

Daily lessons will consist of Mathematics circle time with a main focus on...

- Counting, recognising numbers, knowing number order, 1:1 counting
- Comparison: more/less/same
- Composition: Adding, subtracting, sharing, doubling and halving
- We will also be teaching shape/space and measures and patterns in preparation for Year 1 in addition to the core curriculum. We follow the NCETM and will be using Numberblocks.

There will also be:

- Smaller adult - led group work
- Challenges – children are given a reason & motivation to choose to work with maths
- Opportunities and provocations for using maths in play



Mathematics at home, you can encourage your child to...

- Use numbers and identify them in the environment (house numbers, shops, road signs, number plates, supermarket, menus)
- Counting objects 1:1 while playing
- Kitchen maths- weighing, measuring, halving, counting



How will Phonics be taught?

Phonics is the teaching of early reading and writing. We teach Sounds Write phonics.

- Children have a daily lesson
- Children are taught as a Reception class and will work as a whole class
- Smaller adult-led learning groups
- Challenges – children are given a reason & motivation to choose to work with words
- Opportunities and provocations for using reading and writing in play

Phonics at home, you can encourage your child to...

- Learn the sounds in their name
- Say the initial sounds of words
- Spot the sound... (on packaging, street names, in stories)
- 'Say the sounds to hear/read the word' – sounding out words for children to guess
- In Reception, read their decodable books with you everyday



How will Literacy be taught?

Daily lessons will consist of carpet time with a main focus on...

- Letter formation - handwriting
- Recognition of sounds for spelling
- Sentence structure
- Writing for a purpose, communicating
- Rhyming

There will also be:

- Smaller adult-led group work
- Concept Cat- learning to understand and use new vocabulary and concepts
- Helicopter Stories- children learning to listen to stories, act them out and become storytellers themselves
- Storytimes and talk through stories (all our enquiries have book hooks as a base)
- Challenges – children are given a reason and motivation to choose to read and write
- Opportunities and provocations for reading and writing in play



Literacy at home, you can encourage your child to...

- Writing opportunities and modelling by adults (shopping lists, cards, stories, letters)
- Reading (model reading road signs, packaging, labels) and bedtime stories



Mighty Warriors

As part of the PE curriculum, we have a visit from Liam, who teaches the children key skills in physical education.

This is every Thursday and the children are to come to school in their PE kit.



How can I prepare my child for Reception?

- Talk to your child
- Practise listening skills
- Enjoy books, stories and rhymes
- Play games: practise sharing and turn taking
- Develop an interest in the world around us
- Use the toilet independently
- Dress and undress independently
- Practise blowing your nose, throwing the tissue in the bin and washing hands straight away
- Say 'please' and 'thank you'
- Recognise their name
- Hold a pencil / crayon using pincer grip



First day nerves

- Understandably your child may feel nervous or anxious. It is important that beforehand you prepare your child for school by talking about school experiences positively.
- Encourage questions and discussion.
- Try not to let your child know how nervous you are.





How will my child keep track of their belongings?

- We teach children to look after things (their own, things belonging to others and to school)
- They will have their own labeled peg outside Nursery and Reception class
- You can help your child to identify their own belongings by putting their name in every item of clothing, even shoes!
- Clearly label water bottles, lunch boxes, book bags etc.



The first few weeks...

- You will drop your child off at the nursery door, which is located in the school playground.
- Your child will arrive and put their coat and bag on their labelled peg.
- Play on arrival (for first couple of weeks)
- When children are ready we switch to name writing and carpet time first thing.
- Separate snack times and self-contained outdoor play.
- You will collect your child from the nursery door, which is located on the school playground.





What is a day in Early Years like?

- Early Years is all about learning and exploring through play.
- This includes problem solving, taking turns, sharing, waiting your turn and having fun.
- Our day is flexible but we like to have a routine that the children can follow, so they know what to expect and when.
- We inform the children of any changes to the routine.
- Reception have set times for Phonics and Number work, every day.
- We have a whole class input for learning about our topics.
- We have story time twice a day.
- We have singing and dancing throughout the day.



MyChildAtSchool (MCAS)



As a parent you are juggling everything from paying school dinners, wraparound care, trips and clubs. Along with keeping up with what is happening at school from special events to when is it sports day? That is in between everyday life...

To make everything accessible and easy as possible we use MyChildAtSchool, where you can quickly see everything at a glance.

To create an account, we require your email address. A form for consent to contact you will be provided in your starter pack.







School dinners Nursery and Reception

- Reception pupils have universal free meals.

We are very proud to have a brand new chef manager serving delicious and nutritious meals.

Each meal is prepared on-site by our chef and kitchen staff, who know all the children by name!

We have a 3 week menu, offering lots of different choices. The menus can be viewed on our website.

Meals are selected on a weekly basis.



Packed lunches

Children can also bring a packed lunch as an alternative to the cooked meal but are not allowed to chop and change between school meals and packed lunches.

Ideally, whatever you decide at the beginning of each term should remain in place until the beginning of the next term. Your co-operation in these matters will be greatly appreciated.



Packed lunches should ideally contain healthy options. They should not include glass bottles or sweets of any description.

Wraparound care

Breakfast Club

Is available Monday to Friday, opening at 7:30am

£4 per child, per session

Our breakfast club supervisors will greet you at the first door of the school hall.

Breakfast items provided are a choice of cereal, toast and a drink of fruit juice or water.

Children will be taken to their classrooms ready for the start of the school day.

After School Club

Is available Monday to Friday, 3:10pm - 5.30pm

£4 per child, per one hour session an additional £2 per half hour session

3.10pm - 4.10pm = £4.00 | 3.10pm - 5.10pm = £8.00 3.10pm - 5.30pm = £10.00

Following an after-school club the prices are:

4.10pm-5.10pm = £4 | 4.10pm-5.35pm = £6

A light snack and a drink will be provided.

Our uniform Your checklist

Please label all items of clothing so we can get any lost items back to you or your child - thank you

Girls uniform

- Bottle green jumper/cardigan with a school badge
- White polo shirt (school badge optional)
- Grey trousers or skirt
- Green and white gingham dress
- Black school shoes, grey socks or tights

Boys uniform

- Bottle green jumper with a school badge
- White polo shirt (school badge optional)
- Grey trousers or shorts
- Black school shoes, grey socks

PE Kit

- Bottle green sports hoodie with a school badge
- Bottle green joggers with a school badge
- White t-shirt with a school badge
- Green or black shorts
- Black plimsolls for indoor
- Plain black trainers for outdoor (no named brands)

Accessories; water bottle, school book bag (for their letters and drawings), PE bag for wellies



What if...? Questions you may have

My child has an accident?

- An adult will help your child with first aid or assistance to clean up/change if necessary.

My child is poorly at school?

- If we are concerned about your child, we will call you and, if we feel it's necessary, we will ask you to collect your child.

My child needs the toilet?

- We do expect children to use the toilet independently but adults will talk children through difficulties (or help if necessary). Children can access the toilets freely, but we teach them to ask permission to leave the circle in whole-class teaching times.



What if...? Questions you may have

My child has an appointment?

- Ideally, appointments should be made for the beginning or end of a school day, so that as little school time is lost as is possible.

Please let us know in advance if your child will be absent. This can be by telephone 01642 643400, a Dojo message to your child's teacher or via email: office@stjohnte.bhcet.org.uk

What if I am late?

- If you will be late due to unforeseen circumstances, please phone the office to let us know. This way, we can all reassure your child so that they will not worry.



What if...? Questions you may have

My child is poorly at home?

- If your child is going to be absent, please speak to our office staff on 01642 643400, you have the option to leave a message, for safeguarding please let us know as soon as possible.
- We ask that if your child has sickness or diarrhea, they do not come into school for 48 hours after the last occurrence.

I need to talk to someone about any concerns?

It is important you know that you are welcome talk to us any time!

- Teachers are available at the very start of the day for a “quick” message.
- It is better to make a telephone appointment if the matter you need to discuss will take some time – either with the Headteacher or a member of staff.
