# Our Faith on Sunday

### **GOSPEL REFLECTION**



The only certainty in life is death. And yet we often live our lives as if we going to live forever. In today's Gospel Jesus reminds us that we must always keep the fact of our death, and the fact that we don't know when it will come, at the front of our minds. This doesn't mean that we should have a morbid

awareness of death, but rather a realistic one: we don't know when it will come, so - be ready. And how can be always ready? By living God's will as well as we can in each present moment. However hard we try, we will find ourselves wandering away from what God wants of us because of our flawed human nature. So what should we do when fins we have wandered off

the track? Get back on it as soon as we can. One good way to do this is to take advantage of the gifts God has given us to help us 'start again' when we have fallen. The Sacrament of reconciliation is that gift. Through this very special gift, we are reconciled with God and with our brothers and sisters and all our

sins, our mistakes, our selfishness is consumed in God's mercy. When we come out of the confessional we are like new people, ready to start again on our journey towards God. Some people say they don't see the point of confession because they always have the same sins. Think of it this way: if I only clean my windows once a year, by the end of the year I won't see much through them; if I clean them once a month, I will have a clear view most of the time.



## EVANGELII GAUDIUM (JOY OF THE GOSPEL)

# POPULIST

158. Here, there can be a misunderstanding. "People' is not a logical category, nor is it a mystical category, if by that we mean that everything the people does is good, or that the people is an 'angelic' reality. Rather, it is a mythic category... When you have to explain what you mean by people, you use logical categories for the sake of explanation, and necessarily so. Yet in that way you cannot explain what it means to belong to a people. The word 'people' has a deeper meaning that cannot be set forth in purely logical terms. To be part of a people is to be part of a shared identity arising from social and cultural bonds. And that is not something automatic, but rather a slow, difficult process... of advancing towards a common project".132

It is obvious that those who are in love with God do not attain the heights of devotion straight away. They experience the sweetness of contemplation only sporadically. Hard work is needed to prepare the ground, for only then can we feel some joy in loving God.

We can be very virtuous and yet not experience the warmth of God's love and be able to sing in our hearts the song of divine praise. It is rare for anyone to be raised to the level of jubilant song. This song is that which is constantly sung in heaven, full of harmony and sweetness. Those who experience it are the true contemplatives. Having sat long in solitude they have kept company with angels, exulting and rejoicing in Jesus.
