

Day for Life 2025 - "Every year, the Church in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland, jointly marks the Day for Life, as a reminder of the need to respect and protect the inherent value and dignity of each life. This year, it will be celebrated on Trinity Sunday, the 15th of June. The faithful are invited to join in prayer and promotion of the Day. Useful resources, including a message from the three bishops, and prayers, can be found on the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales' website.

On the 15th of June we will also hold a second collection for the Day for Life Fund. Every year, the fund allocates over £200,000 in grants, to organisations that promote the Christian respect for life from conception to natural death, in various ways. This has made a significant impact in local communities of England and Wales, by for example, providing mothers and children with necessary means. This is possible if it was not for your generous support to the fund, we therefore invite you to give as much as you can and encourage others to do so. GOSPEL REFLECTION



"Spirit". It is the Spirit who gives life, who "renews" the face of the earth, who brings about a "new creation".

Without the Spirit Iesus would just be another historical figure and the Gospel would be iust an ancient text to be studied by scholars. Jesus gives us the gift of the Spirit and it is this same Spirit which allows us to cry out "Abba, Father!" It is the Spirit which brings us right into the centre of the communion of love of the Father, the Son, and the Spirit. In his Letter to the

Christianity is a religion of the Romans, Paul writes that, "the love of God has been poured into our hearts through the Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom 5,5). The Spirit

that is given to us is the Spirit of the Risen Jesus and to receive the gift of this Spirit we too must die and rise with Christ through our immersion in the waters of baptism. But this is just the beginning of our lives as Christians. It is in the living out of our baptism by allowing ourselves to be guided by Spirit in our words, deeds and actions that we can hope to say with Paul that "it is no longer I who live but Christ who lives in me" (Gal 2,20).

THE VALUE AND MEANING OF FORGIVENESS

236. There are those who prefer not to talk of reconciliation, for they think that conflict, violence and breakdown are part of the normal functioning of a society. In any human group there are always going to be more or less subtle power struggles between different parties. Others think that promoting forgiveness means yielding ground and influence to others. For this reason, they feel it is better to keep things as they are, maintaining a balance of power between differing groups. Still others believe that reconciliation is a sign of weakness; incapable of truly serious dialogue, they choose to avoid problems by ignoring injustices. Unable to deal with problems, they opt for an apparent peace.

In a lyrical passage of Saint Paul, we see some of the features of true love:

"Love is patient, love is kind;

love is not jealous or boastful;

it is not arrogant or rude.

Love does not insist on its own way,

it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong,

but rejoices in the right.

Love bears all things, believes all things,

hopes all things,

endures all things" (1 Cor 13:4-7).

Love is experienced and nurtured in the daily life of couples and their children. It is helpful to think more deeply about the meaning of this Pauline text and its relevance for the concrete situation of every family.
