Students and staff at The English Martyrs Catholic School and Sixth Form College are celebrating after receiving a prestigious Artsmark Award in a momentous year for the programme as it celebrates 20 years of arts, culture and creativity in schools.

The Artsmark Award is the only creative quality standard for schools, accredited by Arts Council England. In order to achieve their Gold Artsmark Award, the secondary school and sixth form college had to develop their arts and culture provision to embed a broad and ambitious curriculum. This was achieved by creating an overall plan that was committed to and delivered across the whole school.

EMS was supported by Tyne & Wear Archives and Museums (Culture Bridge North East) in planning and developing their objectives. Culture Bridge worked alongside the school at various stages to support their Gold Artsmark Award achievement.

Students and staff from The English Martyrs School and Sixth Form College are celebrating the success of their latest musical performance of 'Oliver!'

Performed to nearly eight hundred spectators over a three-night run at Hartlepool Town Hall Theatre, the cast and crew put on a production that left audiences full of praise for the young talent on show, with many messages of support being left on the school's social media channels. The annual musical at English Martyrs is a long-served tradition of the school and thousands of students have trodden the boards in various musicals across the past fifty years.

'Oliver!' is the first production from EMS since the success of 'Sister Act' in February 2020, a week before the pandemic, which meant this was the first musical for a large number of the cast.

Academic Enrichment

Our fantastic Academic Enrichment programme is underway for Year 11 students. Students have one half hour session for every subject they study, which is either on a lunch time or after school. The sessions are short, sharp and supportive and offer students that extra opportunity to aspire to be as successful as possible in the summer. Well done Year 11 and keep up the brilliant work!

Enrichment

This year, over 80 activities are being offered to students each week. These activities range from sport, music and history, to Pokemon, SVP and Debate Club. Each department is offering at least one club to help enrich their curriculum areas and students have responded very well to the offer of clubs this year. The clubs last between 30 minutes to 1hr on a morning, at lunchtime and afterschool. St Charles' is 150!

In November, the students and staff at St Charles' celebrated the school's 150th birthday. The original school was opened in 1873 as a result of the rapidly increasing generation of the parish. The 1870 Education Act together with population increases in the area prompted religious bodies to provide the necessary educational facilities for the young. By the early 1870's there were approximately 500 students in the parish and so the provision of a Catholic School was essential. Records show that in 1873, the 513 students were divided into only five classes!

Our celebrations took place with the students and staff, both past and present, celebrating a special Mass with Father Anthony on All Saints Day, followed by further celebrations for the Feast Day of St Charles of Borromeo a few days later. The students enjoyed learning about the history of St Charles and ended the week with delicious ice creams.

STEM project

St Cuthbert's Hartlepool have taken part in a STEM project with a local construction firm enabling children to be inspired at a young age to pursue careers in construction - especially females! Lisa Molloy, Construction and Commercial Manager at Tees Valley-based Seymour Civil Engineering, visited St Cuthbert's Catholic Primary School to promote a career in industry.

It all comes as part of a push to upskill the region's workforce and bridge the skills gap as game-changing major projects are developed over the next 15 to 20 years. Promoting construction to primary school youngsters, parents and teachers was at the heart of the visit, which focussed on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). Year 6 got the chance to hear what Lisa did for a living, learn more about construction, and plan and build a costed project as part of an exercise. Lisa said: "The construction industry currently faces an unprecedented skills shortage which is only predicted to become worse. Molly in Construction is aimed specifically at primary school students to inform students, parents and teachers about the great careers in construction available to all."

Year 6 students looked at a range of careers for all skill levels and had the chance to work in teams to build bridges to hold a particular weight. They had a rewarding day which provided further aspiration, a better understanding of the range of careers available to them in Hartlepool and a desire to achieve goals set.

A group of KS2 are enjoying participating in the 'Arlo Allotment' Project which is run by the Corner House Youth Project. This exciting initiative aims to connect students with the natural outdoor environment, through working on the allotment and also through creative workshops. The weekly sessions follow different topics each week with an ongoing emphasis on supporting
