MOTHERING SUNDAY

In medieval times this Sunday, "Laetare" or refreshing Sunday, was a day when people returned to their "mother church"- church where they were baptised or to the cathedral (mother church of the diocese). It was a day off for domestic servants to give the chance to "go mothering" with their families. The making of simnel cake was also associated with this middle Sunday of Lent, a day of respite from the Lenten fast.

In early 20thC this day took on a more secular theme, popularised in the USA, of calling it Mother's Day with all the commercial activity which goes with it!

FIRST READING

A reading from the second book of Chronicles

36:14-16, 19-23

Ps 136. R. V6

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

GOSPEL REFLECTION



Today's Gospel is a masterpiece in explaining why Jesus came into the world and what the consequences are, both for those who believe and those who refuse to believe. One phrase I particular gives a clue as

because they 'prefer darkness to the light'. Because of original sin, there is a tendency in each of us to prefer darkness to light. It is a tendency when we don't 'want' to. St Paul himself says that he finds himself doing wrong when he is fully aware that he should not do it. In fact, the root of sin, unless we allow Jesus to uproot it, will constantly lead to do the wrong we would rather not do. And this is precisely why Jesus had to become incarnate and die for us. He knew full well that with our

why some will be condemned. It is own strength it is impossible to destroy the roots of sin within us. So, believing in Jesus means, first and foremost, that without him we can do nothing, and especially which causes us to do wrong, even nothing about our tendency towards evil. The season of Lent is a good time to reflect on this truth and to ask him to give us the strength which only he can give.

170. I would once more observe that "the financial crisis of 2007-08 provided an opportunity to develop a new economy, more attentive to ethical principles, and new ways of regulating speculative financial practices and virtual wealth. But the response to the crisis did not include rethinking the outdated criteria which continue to rule the world".147 Indeed, it appears that the actual strategies developed worldwide in the wake of the crisis fostered greater individualism, less integration and increased freedom for the truly powerful, who always find a way to escape unscathed.

If we are truly devout, we are impervious to the devil's darts and continue to think constantly of the beloved. Our meditation becomes a song of glory and praise. We pass straight from this life to heaven, for being a friend of light rather than darkness, we are lovers of life itself.

To love purely is to be like topaz, a precious jewel that needs no polishing and is found but rarely. True contemplatives are also rare and should not be given positions of ecclesial authority or secular employment. They are like gold in their outstanding love; like the sky in the glory of their heavenly living. They surpass the life of any saint. Their sole purpose is to love and possess the life of God. Leave true contemplatives alone rather than offering them honours, and they will continue to grow brighter and brighter.
