World Religion Day-



The children explored these values in class during the week and on Friday, each class shared what they'd learnt with the whole school in our celebration assembly.

Martin Luther King Day-

On Tuesday 27th January, we learnt about Holocaust Memorial Day. We explored the concept of speaking out about injustice and ensuring everyone is treated fairly.



Attendance

Children are required to be at school by 9am as our core subject lessons (English and Maths) begin immediately after registration.

Appointments should be made out of school time where possible please.

Holidays should be taken outside of term time.

The Department for Education deems that if a child's attendance drops below 90%, they become known as a Persistent Absentee. All absences are monitored thoroughly.

To celebrate great attendance, children with 100% in a week receive 10 dojos on a Friday. The class with the highest percentage will also receive 10 dojos per child.

Below are the percentages of attendance for each class for January

Matthew (Nursery/Reception) – 89.2%

Mark (Year 1/2) – 92.9%

Luke (Year 3/4) – 94.0%

John (Year 5/6) – 92.4%

The government's target for attendance for primary school pupils is at least 95%.

Our whole school attendance for January was 91.6%

A child is classed as late if they arrive at school after 9.20am.

0.1% of our pupils arrived late in January.

A child is classed as unauthorised absence if they arrive at school after 9.30am.

2.5% of our pupils had unauthorised absences in January.



Uniform

School uniform promotes a sense of pride in the school and makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance.

If your child is not in correct school uniform, we will ask for correct uniform to be brought in for your child to change into.

Our uniform is:

- Red sweatshirt or sweat cardigan
- White polo shirt
- Grey trousers or skirt/pinafore dress
- Sensible, plain black leather shoes/ trainers



Jeans and leggings are not permitted. Skirts and trousers should be grey not black.

Homework

Homework reinforces and helps your child to retain information taught in the classroom. It also develops study habits and independent learning.

For Year 1 to Year 6, we kindly ask that your child is listened to reading daily and their reading record is signed. Your child will receive a dojo for each signature in their record.

For Year 1 to Year 6, your child will also receive maths and spelling homework each Friday to be handed back in by the following Thursday.

Times tables are extremely important for children in Year 3 to Year 6. In Year 4, children take a times tables test. Every child has log in details for Times Tables Rockstars - <https://trockstars.com/> We would greatly appreciate it if your child could regularly practise their times tables at home.

PE

On PE days, children are to come to school dressed in their PE kit.

Our PE uniform is:



- Plain white T-shirt with no branding or logos from professional sports teams
- Plain black shorts or tracksuit bottoms with no branding or logos from professional sports teams



- Red sweatshirt or sweat cardigan or hoodie



- Suitable black trainers



If your child comes to school in PE kit on a day which is not their PE day, we will ask for uniform to be brought in for your child to change into.

Jewellery and Hairstyles

Wrist watches are permitted but not smart watches.

Piercings (including earrings) are not permitted.

Pupils with long hair must ensure that this does not impede their vision, cover their face or provide a health and safety risk. Long hair must be tied up during practical lessons, e.g. PE.

The following hairstyles are not considered appropriate for school:

brightly coloured, dyed hair, headwear with bold patterns or colours, excessive hair accessories.
