## **Ealing Schools' Catering Consortium**

St. Joseph's is part of the ESCC; a large group of Ealing schools joining together to provide food for our children. For the past few years, Harrison Catering have been the school meals provider. However, just before the pandemic the company lost the contract but the ESCC came to an agreement that Harrison Catering would continue until the end of this academic year. The new company is ISS Education and they will be taking over the kitchens in September. On Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> June, our school office will be closed for enquiries between 10am and 11.30am whilst Mrs. O'Rourke and Mrs. Banks are trained on the new online payment system that ISS Education use; emergency calls will continue to be taken. Mrs. McNee will be receiving training on special diets and will be able to help parents complete forms for children with allergies. I have attached two information flyers from ISS Education to the back of this newsletter for your information.

On Monday, PC McGuigan made her final visit to Year 6. The children were invited to name 'good' and 'bad' drugs they had heard of and to discuss their effects on the body and consequences on a person's life. The children decided that 'good' drugs are those you can get from the doctor or chemist and use safely by following the instructions. PC McGuigan always talks candidly and tells the truth; the children were very engaged by her real-life accounts of how drugs affect people's lives and families. The children discussed drug dealers and addicts; they saw some before and after images of people who had become addicted to drugs and the effect on their body. ## **World Book Day**



#### In the event...


In the event that somebody in your household wakes up with a fever (>37.8°C), or a new, continuous cough or a loss of the sense of smell or taste do not send your child to school. Immediately inform the school via email or phone and then book a test for the person. The whole household must then self-isolate. If the test returns negative and nobody has any ongoing symptoms, the child can return to school and the household no longer needs to self-isolate. If a positive result is returned, the household must self-isolate for 10 days and resume normal activity after 10 days as long as they have been symptom free for 48 hours.

If your child has a sniffle, runny nose or is sneezing, they are not coronavirus symptoms and your child should come to school if well enough.
