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


Safer Streets - Experimental School Street

The Safer Streets programme is gathering momentum! I have asked St. Joseph's to be considered for an Experimental School Street scheme to help you and your family to stay safe as you travel to and from school each day. This will be a short closure of the street to through traffic at the start and end of the school day, making the road less congested, safer, quieter, more pleasant place for you all. Residents will still have access, as will blue badge holders, but no other parents or carers will be allowed to drive into the street during the closure times. There will be a barrier placed at the closure to stop vehicles from entering the school street. This is planned to begin in the autumn term.

For the scheme to go ahead, the council is asking parents, carers, older pupils and residents to complete a survey to collect their views, before deciding. The pupils will complete the survey in class with their teachers. We ask you, our parents and carers, to please support us by completing the parent/carer survey which can be found by clicking on this link: www.ealing.gov.uk/newschoolstreets. The survey opens on 24th May and will close at midnight on the 14th June.

I believe this will make the journey to school much safer for you and your children and would like as many of you as possible to support us by completing this short survey. The letter from the Council is attached at the back from which you will be able to click on links for more information.

Our Deanery continues to work together and on Wednesday, Our Lady of the Visitation led a lovely prayer session over the internet – praying without borders. Usually, St. Joseph's would have been represented by our Year 6 Pupil Chaplains, but as they were away at Boreatton Park, some Year 5 children stepped in to represent our school, thank you.



Use of Phones

Parents, please do not use your mobile phones when inside the school gates. When picking up your child in the afternoon, they deserve your full attention! Also, I have had reports of our Year 5 and Year 6 children, who walk home alone, having their lovely, expensive phones out and easily visible. We talk to the children about safety, can you please follow this up at home.

Late pick-ups

Every so often, one can have a mishap which results in being late for afternoon pick-up. It can be upsetting for the child but when this happens we look after the child as if it were our own. However, when late pick-up becomes habitual, it feels like we are being taken advantage of. From September, I am considering sending children to the After School Club where a fee will be charged for looking after your child.

Oral Health

I was very impressed by the Oral Health talks delivered a couple of weeks back. In a conversation with the facilitator, she said that because of lockdown many families had not visited their dentist in over a year. Road incidents

Sadly, I have been made aware of three incidents this week where careless driving by members of our community have endangered pedestrians and cyclists. In one case, foul and abusive language was used within earshot of children. This is not the kind of example that should be set for the children and it will not be tolerated. Please report any serious incidents to the Police.

Stranger Danger

In school we cover the topic of 'Stranger Danger' fairly regularly and remind the children about keeping safe, particularly when walking to or from school and encouraging them to report anything suspicious. However, I want to share some information I received last Friday from the Safer Schools Police. There have been reports in London of a male in a van (and potentially with a female also) attempting to speak to students/watching students. This is just a precautionary message to remind you to share with your child the importance of being vigilant and to report any incidents to the police straight away.

Your brilliant children

Ironically, the higher up the leadership scale you go, the less time you spend with the children – the main reason you went into teaching in the first place. With Year 6 being away this week, I was tasked with supervising Early Morning Drop Off Club and I also had reason to cover a Year 4 class for part of the day. The children were impeccably behaved and worked and played really well. It was lovely to witness how the children care about their learning and friendships. Credit is due to the children, parents and staff alike. Well done!

Laudato Si' project – Caring for our common home

This weekend at home, have a think about all the ways that we can make our supplies last longer. During the school day, do you make sure that you replace lids on pens; rule under your last piece of work so that you can do the next piece of work on that page; avoid printing off sheets (where possible)? When you have your food do you make sure that you only take as much as you need; don't waste any snacks; drink up all your drinks; don't throw away leftovers? When you leave a room do you turn off the light/ TV/ game consoles/ your toy batteries?

Challenge: Think about your family members. What one thing could they do to help save energy or make supplies go further. Challenge them, and yourself, to make small changes that can make a big difference.

In the event...

In the event that somebody in your household wakes up with a fever (>37.8°C), or a new, continuous cough or a loss of the sense of smell or taste do not send your child to school. Immediately inform the school via email or phone and then book a test for the person. The whole household must then self-isolate. If the test returns negative and nobody has any ongoing symptoms, the child can return to school and the household no longer needs to self-isolate. If a positive result is returned, the household must self-isolate for 10 days and resume normal activity after 10 days as long as they have been symptom free for 48 hours.

If your child has a sniffle, runny nose or is sneezing, they are not coronavirus symptoms and your child should come to school if well enough.

Dear Sir or Madam,

Ealing Council wants to make the Borough a great place to live, work and spend time in. Good, sustainable transport is a fundamental part of the council's priorities to create 'Healthy Streets' that seek to reduce pollution and increase physical activity rates by providing safe, convenient alternatives to short car journeys.

Our Transport Strategy aims to build a positive legacy to enhance the environment and improve public health by focusing on 'active travel' (walking and cycling). We will improve streets and transport infrastructure to reduce dependency on cars to prioritise active, efficient and sustainable travel modes, making Ealing a healthier, cleaner, safer and more accessible place for all.

Ealing Council would like to make changes to the streets in your area, called 'a School Street'. We have launched an online survey to help residents and businesses have their say on the proposed scheme. Your feedback will be used to consider any changes that need to be made and help us to make the decision on how to proceed.

What is a School Street?

A School Street is where the streets around a school are closed to most traffic at school opening and closing times. Closing the streets to school and through traffic helps to achieve a safer, more pleasant environment for everyone, whilst maintaining access for residents and businesses within the designated zone, and all pedestrians and cyclists.

We implemented 12 experimental schemes for 14 schools last Autumn. Our current experience shows that residents often enjoy their streets more because the School Street reduces traffic, stops school related parking issues (e.g. across driveways) and helps to improve air quality in the local area, as there are fewer cars and more families use active travel for their school journey.

Understandably, residents outside the zone may be concerned about displacement of traffic. However, our experience, and that of other London Boroughs, indicates that traffic tends to evaporate rather than be displaced. Schools will encourage families to use active modes of travel for all or part of their school journey, thereby reducing car use. Parking by those who do need to drive will be dispersed over a much wider area and should not affect residents.

We hope to implement the School Street for St Joseph's Catholic Primary School in September 2021. It will involve the introduction of **temporary barriers** at the locations shown on the map overleaf, **between 8:30 – 9:00am and 2:45 – 3.30pm**, Monday to Friday. The School Street will not operate

on weekends or during school holidays. The barriers are movable and will be managed by volunteers from the school. Outside School Street operational hours, the barriers will be removed.

Vehicle access to the scheme

Only residents living within the scheme and vehicles registered at businesses within the scheme, as indicated on the map overleaf, will be able to access the School Street zone, during operational hours. Each household within the scheme will be issued with one School Street Permit, that they will show to the volunteer if they wish to enter the School Street when the barrier is in place. Additional permits for vehicles registered at a property within the school street, can be requested and details on how to do this will be sent prior to launch of the scheme. All School Street Permits are issued free of charge for eligible vehicles.

The impacts on refuse have been considered in collaboration with the council's Waste and Recycling team. As with all transport schemes, we also consult with the Emergency Services on any change to their routes and access.

Experimental Traffic Order and Consultation

This School Street will be implemented using an Experimental Traffic Order (ETO). Unlike our normal schemes, the statutory consultation for ETO's usually takes place during the **first 6 months after the scheme is installed**. An ETO is a standard legal document used across the country to enable installation of measures such as School Streets, pavement widening and cycle lanes or other innovative schemes.

By nature of the Traffic Order, this is an experimental scheme. This means that you can continue to provide feedback on your experience of the scheme during the first 6 months and, if required, changes can be made, before the Council decides whether or not to make it a permanent scheme. We will undertake a formal consultation on the scheme after the scheme has been in place for 6 months.

Funding of the scheme

The scheme is being implemented using funding made available to Transport for London (TfL) by Central Government. The funding is only available for schemes that help with social distancing and promote walking and cycling.
