### Ash Wednesday

On Monday 7<sup>th</sup> March, for the price of £1 children may come to school wearing blue and yellow clothes (the colours of the Ukrainian flag) instead of their school uniform. All monies collected will go to charities that support the Ukrainian people affected by the Russian invasion.

A parent has asked me to appeal to you to donate emergency medical supplies such as bandages, painkillers, post-burn gels and plasters, burn creams, gloves, alcohol wipes. These can be dropped off at the school office and will be collected by the parent and then sent on.

### Laudato Si' project - Caring for our common home

Food Waste Action Week 2022 begins next week on the 7<sup>th</sup> March. Did you know that around a third of the food produced globally is lost or wasted and it's having a real impact on climate change, contributing 8–10% of total man-made greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions? Combined with the recent increases in the cost of groceries, it makes



sense to help our Earth, consciences and our pockets by reducing the amount of food waste in each household. What about these ideas:

- Rather than serve dinner on plates, allow the family to help themselves from central dishes. People will take what they think they can eat (and can always help themselves to more), and you may even have enough leftovers for the next day's lunch.
- If your child has a packed lunch, ask them to bring home their leftovers rather than throwing them away. You will be able to see if your child is eating the portions that you are giving them.

Challenge: Just before your next grocery shop write a list for your parent of all the items left in the fridge/ larder which have passed their sell-by date and need to be thrown away. Is it always lettuce/ Potatoes/ Bread? Then help your parents come up with meals for the week. Meal planning helps to eliminate waste and impulse purchases.

### **Planters**

18 planters were delivered at school this week. The PTA funded project will allow each class to have an outdoor garden where they can grow their own fruit and vegetables. Another five planters are being donated by the Nurkowski family in school. Research shows that more than 96% of children are not eating enough fruit and vegetables and that children in schools which grow food eat more than one and a half more of their five-a-day than other school children.



#### **Internet Safety**

A while ago we had some children trying to access images of a scary doll "Momo". We put a stop to it very quickly but the issue has arisen again. Please ensure that you remain vigilant of your child's searches of online content on phones, tablets, computers and gaming platforms to ensure content is appropriate. Inappropriate use of the internet in school will be dealt with swiftly and we ask you to work with us to keep your children safe while online.



### **Recycle4charity**

Thank you to all the children and parents who have been recycling ink cartridges at St. Joseph's. We have already raised some money which will go towards resourcing our school. ### Reception

The children in reception had a fantastic day. We started the day with a World Book Day parade in the Infant Hall with Nursery and Year 1. The children had great fun walking along the catwalk to music. In class, we discussed the importance of World Book Day, the book brought in by the children. ### Year 3

During assembly, the children loved parading their costumes to the rest of the Middle Phase. The children displayed great enjoyment and knowledge of books in the quiz. A highlight for the children was The Masked Reader, where they had to guess the teacher and the blurb being read behind a disguise.







### Year 4

Today, for World Book day, Year 4 were asked to come to school as characters from books. At 9am, we walked into the hall and performed a parade by walking around the hall and then we watched 'The Masked Reader' where the teachers had to read using Snapchat and we had to guess who was reading. When we returned to class, we created our rap about World Book Day which we are going to record on Audacity to create class songs. ### Year 5
