

Reception







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


In Reception this week we have been learning about Baptism. We role played a baptism in our classrooms.

Year 2


It has been great being back at school! (And being taught by professionals).




Year 3

Year 4


In Year 4, for History we have been learning about the Romans. This is a really fun topic. We have learnt about Roman Numerals and how the Romans invaded Britain. Their technique for this was called 'the turtle' — see, it looks like a turtle! Military of the Roman Republic and Empire wore loosely regulated dress and armour. The contemporary concept of uniforms was not part of Roman culture and there were considerable differences in their detail. They also had a helmet and a shield. You might laugh when I tell you this, but the Romans invented toilets!!



Maths is really fun in Year 4. We have just started to learn about the angle family. Have you heard of it? Their names are: obtuse, acute, right and reflex angles. Be careful though — the right angle can be anywhere. They could be in the bottom left, bottom right, top right or top left!



We have used this book to extend our knowledge in different subjects.

We were also lucky enough to speak to the Year 5 teachers and find out more about them!


Year 6

Hello


Think being a student at St Joseph's is hard — try a day in a Victorian School!

Lots of English, arithmetic and Bible studies would fill your day. Everyone reads the same book at the same time, line by li ne. Pupils had a tedious and tiresome day reciting tables over and over again.



Book reviews


Clean Break
