

This book is about Mr. Grinling who is a lighthouse keeper.





I got the answer 4 by dividing the number by the denominator (the bottom number).



And guess what! We did a test! A test of fractions! The front page looked like word problems but they were just the instructions!!! The test was good but sometimes a bit hard.






Year 4




Year 4

How to train a Dragon

What you will need:


Dragon Food (sheep,pigs,cows)

Now, I will show you what Year 5 are learning in Science. Maybe Science interests you more than History.

We are learning about properties of materials. Do you know what happens if you add flour to water or salt in water? In this term we will be learning about how materials react.

Do you know that by dissolving salt in water you can make a **solution?** You can separate the salt from the water again by making the solution hot. The water will evaporate until it is all gone. The salt will be left behind. That is called evaporating.





Filtering

You can separate a mixture of sand and water by passing it through a piece of filter paper. The water is able to pass through the tiny gaps in the paper but the sand particles are too big and are left on the surface of the filter paper.




Art

The dots used for pop art are called "Ben-Day Dots" and are always the same width and distance away from each other. It is quite easy to make a mistake doing this with cotton buds and paint — Liechtenstein's dots are normally printed to make a perfect picture, but if it wasn't printed it would probably look a lot messier if Roy used a marker.

One more thing we've done is use tracing paper to create self-portraits with paint and cotton buds. The teachers were a lot of help here — they took the pictures of us, so thank you for your help! Have you ever heard the words **Evolution** or **Inheritance**? No? Us neither — but we learnt all about it in Science.




Year 6

Well, as you know, I'm already very lucky to be a member of St Joseph's staff, and to be perfectly honest, there's no other job I'd rather do.


If you could be any famous person for one day, who would you like to be?

I would love to be a children's author - Julia Donaldson is my absolute favourite - or an interior designer/ architect.




A message from our Pupil Chaplains







STEP 1

- ·Lightly toast the crumpets in a toaster or under the grill.
- •Meanwhile, mix the passata, ketchup and oregano together in a bowl to make the sauce.
- •Chop your chosen toppings into small pieces young children can tear basil, or chop soft veg in a cup using safety scissors.

STEP 2

Line a baking tray with foil.

- •Spread the sauce over the toasted crumpets, then top with the veg and cheese.
- •Arrange on the tray and grill for 3-4 mins, until the cheese is golden and bubbling.
- ·Leave to cool slightly before eating.
