Who will be teaching my child:

Throughout the week, your child may also be taught by other members of our dedicated staff team for specific subjects. On a Thursday morning, Mr. Rose will teach Year 1 PE and Mrs. Rose will teach Music. On Wednesdays Mrs. Holman will teach in Hazel Class and on Fridays she will teach in Holly Class.

Together, we aim to provide a rich and varied learning experience, guided by our school values of being caring, courageous, Christ-like, and part of a celebratory community.

What your child will need and homework

Weekly maths homework will be sent home on a Friday. Homework should ideally be completed by the following Wednesday to give teachers time to mark but can be handed in from the Monday. In addition to this, your child should have daily reading practice at home.

Children have access to Reading Scheme books and Library books. Please leave the reading scheme book and reading record in your child's bag at all times. This is so we can read with them and monitor their progress. In Year 1 we expect the children to hand in their books once they have read them at home hence reading books can be handed in any day of the week and new books will be handed out by the end of the week. We will NOT change your child's book unless an adult from home has recorded in the reading record that it has been read during the week. We regularly monitor your child's stage of phonics and will therefore match their reading books according to this. This may mean revisiting certain stages to consolidate phonic knowledge. It is important that you understand that with this scheme, there is no 'going backwards' and this plays a vital role in enabling your child to be secure and fluent in their phonics for reading and writing. On the inside cover of each reading book there is a helpful before and during reading page. We ask that parents make use of this. Reading regularly at home helps your child to make good progress and we advise trying to read for 10 minutes per day.
