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What is happening?

How are the schools managed at the moment and what are they being asked to do?

Historically the Diocese of Lancaster has owned and overseen a significant number of Catholic schools in the counties of Lancashire and Cumbria.

Many of our schools remain the joint responsibility of the Diocese of Lancaster Education Service and the relevant local authority, while others have left local authority control by becoming academies and joining one of Catholic multi-academy trusts (also known as CMATs) established by the diocese.

The Bishop of Lancaster holds overall responsibility for Catholic education within the Diocese of Lancaster, and has requested that all our schools progress to joining one of the three trusts.

Groups of schools will join their trust family in waves, with the aim of completing the process of welcoming all Diocese of Lancaster schools to their academy trust by the end of the 2025-26 academic year.

We see this as an exciting opportunity to secure the future of our schools, support each other for the common good, and gain greater freedom to deliver education that is responsive to the needs of our pupils.

This booklet offers an overview of the benefits of this change for children, parents, and staff.

What is a multi-academy trust?

Why were they created and what do they do?

Academy trusts were introduced in the early 2000s, and are independent bodies created to run schools.

Academies are publicly-funded schools that operate outside local authority control. Trusts can be established to operate a single academy, or several academies can group together as members of a Catholic multi-academy trust.

Each academy trust is led by a chief executive and board of directors, who set the strategic direction of their trust and are responsible for ensuring that academies have the resources they need to deliver excellent education and staff wellbeing.

Academy trusts receive their funding directly from central government, rather than through a local authority. They have more freedom to set their own policies and curriculum, but pupils still take part in national assessments such as SATs and GCSEs and their performance continues to be assessed by Ofsted.

Academy trust membership is the government's preferred option for running schools.

The Diocese of Lancaster has created three Catholic multi-academy trusts to run its academies. These are:

- The Mater Christi Catholic Multi-Academy Trust - covering north and west Cumbria and north Lancashire [mater-christi.com]
- The Blessed Edward Bamber Catholic Multi-Academy Trust - covering Blackpool, Wyre, and the Fylde coast [bebcmat.co.uk]
- The Mater Ecclesiae Catholic Multi-Academy Trust - covering Preston and the surrounding region [mater-ecclesiae-trust.co.uk]

Within the Diocese of Lancaster, we aim to ensure that our schools retain their distinctive character and local leadership after converting to academies, while benefitting from the guidance and collaborative atmosphere of their Catholic multi-academy trust.

Nourishing and enhancing our schools

Securing the future of Catholic education in the Diocese of Lancaster

Bringing schools together through membership of Catholic multi-academy trusts creates opportunities to make better use of resources and improve the education and support we offer to children and young people.

Sharing resources and expertise allows us to nourish and enhance our schools, improving educational provision, offering better support for vulnerable young people and delivering better value for money.

Working collectively also allows us to enhance the Catholic ethos of our schools through development of future leaders and creation of clear pathways for career development.

We are already seeing the benefits of these collaborations among the existing members of our Catholic multi-academy trusts.

Schools that have become academies have been able to access additional wrap-around support that was not previously available to them, providing extra resilience in areas such as financial management, governance, inspections, health and safety, buildings, safeguarding, quality reviews, training, and collaboration.

An additional benefit is that schools that voluntarily join an academy trust will retain any financial surplus they hold and the freedom to use the funds appropriately to enhance facilities for children and staff.
