- Warning...
- Biased does not mean it is wrong!
- Biased means it only talks about one side of the story.
- Biased can be good, it can be problematic!

Your task:

Decide which of these articles is biased and which one is biased. Tell me why!

Or if you have a newspaper in your house, even better.

Find me 2 articles that you think are biased (can be sports pages) and 2 articles that are balanced.

- Take off from the bench with two feet.
- •Use your arms to swing up and twist in the air.
- Make a stretched shape (straight arms and legs.)
- Extend and stretch throug to your fingers and toes.
- Toes pointed.
- Land facing the bench on two feet with your arms forward for balance.
