

Word	From the Greek Amazones (a tribe of war fighting women) who were dangerous and brutal. As you can imagine, the Amazon River isn't for the faint hearted!		
armada	'Fleet of warships', from Medieval Latin <i>armata</i> meaning 'armed force'. The Spanish Armada was the allegedly invincible fleet sent by Philip II of Spain to defeat England in 1588.		
artery	This word comes from the Latin and Greek word arteria, which means 'windpipe'. The arteries were originally thought to carry air throughout the body.		
assassin	Members of a fanatical Muslim sect during the Crusades used to smoke hashish and then murder leaders on the opposing side. They started going by the name 'hashishiyyin' and through centuries of mispronunciation, English arrived at this word.		
attery	This word originates from Old French baterie, meaning 'beating, thrashing, assault'. In the 1550s the French began to use the word describe artillery units, which discharged explosives towards the enemy walls. In the same sense, during the 1790s, it began to mean 'electrical cell' created by Benjamin Franklin, which discharged electricity much like the artillery.

LI: Can I use circles to structure an observational drawing of a house sparrow?

<u>Some general information about sparrows:</u>

These are noisy and sociable little birds, measuring about 15cm in length. You probably won't realise it, but you will be really familiar with their song as they tend to live and breed near humans as we inadvertently provide them with things to eat and places to nest.

Their diet is pretty varied, and they'll eat just about anything, including seeds, nuts, berries, buds, insects as well as sunflower hearts, high energy seed, peanuts, suet and kitchen scraps.

The male is more vivid in colour than the female so he can attract her as a mate. The female's colours are duller, as she has to remain hidden (camouflaged) from predators when she is raising their chicks.


Sparrows often need us to feed them during wintertime, when their food is scarce.

House sparrows




The circles will also help you get the head in the right position – depending on what the bird is doing, the head will appear in different positions to the body.

TASK: follow the link to watch a tutorial on drawing a house sparrow. You've followed this tutorial before – last year – but we are working towards mastery, and I believe you will be amazed to see the progress you have made.

How to draw a house sparrow

Looking for circular shapes in the sparrow will help you get the size of the head to the body in proportion. You'll notice that the head is quite a look smaller than the body.



Don't forget to use nice, loose, light lines and don't let yourself get stressed with mistakes and imperfections: YOU ARE LEARNING!
