



This week, we are going to look again at adverbs.

Who can remember what an adverb is?

An adverb is a word or phrase that usually describes a verb.

Remember, a verb describes an action. Adverbs can describe time, frequency, manner, place or to what degree something is happening.

Which is the adverb word in this sentence?

Saint George rode off **nobly** having defeated the ferocious dragon.



What do you notice about the adverb 'nobly'? What was its root word before the -ly suffix was added?

Saint George rode off nobly having defeated the ferocious dragon.

noble + ly

What has happened to the root word?

The 'e' has vanished!



Usually, the 'e' disappears from a root word ending in 'le' when it is being changed into an adverb, for example...

noble + ly
probable + ly
humble + ly



Working with a partner, let's play Silly Sentences. I will give you an 'le' root word to turn into an adverb. Then, use the adverb in the silliest sentence that you can think of!

# terrible

For example...

Susan Scratcher had **terribly** long toenails that would always poke through her socks.




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### incredible

Whoops is **possibly** the most clumsy person
on the planet.
