English

This half term, we will be reading the story Escape from Pompeii. We will begin by re-enacting an every day scene from the city of Pompeii before writing a setting description. We will explore the main characters, including how their feelings change and write a character description.

Next, we will study different forms of poetry and write our own free verse poem about the eruption of Vesuvius.

Finally, we will study newspaper recounts about the Eruption of Mount Vesuvius and we will write our own version of the events as if we were a reporter.

The children will continue to have daily spelling, handwriting and SPAG lessons and guided reading sessions once a week.

Science

We will spend time completing our work all about plants from last half term. Our learning will focus on exploring the part that flowers play in the life cycle of flowering plants, including pollination, seed formation and seed dispersal. We will also explore some of the ways in which flowering plants disperse their seeds.



Computing

To begin the half term, the children will take part in coding lessons structured around the PRIMM approach.

- Predict... what this code will do
- Run... the code to check your prediction
- Investigate... trace thought the code to see if you were correct
- Modify... the code to add detail, change actions/outcome
- Make... a new program that uses the same ideas in a different way. Get creative!



Maths

This half term we will begin by taking our second look of the year at **fractions**. We will start by adding and subtracting fractions before moving on to deepen our learning by finding unit and non –unit fractions of objects or amounts. For example: 1/3 of 15 = 5 or 2/3 of 160 = 10.

We will then take another look at **mastering money**. Consolidating notes and coins from previous years. We will then progress to converting between pounds and pence or via versa. We will then look at adding and subtracting amounts before mastering the concept of change.

Finally, we will look at the vital skill of **telling the time**. We will learn to tell and write the time from an analogue clock, including using Roman numerals from I to XII, and 12-hour and 24-hour clocks. Estimate/read time with increasing accuracy to the nearest minute. Record/compare time in terms of seconds, minutes, hours; use vocabulary such as o'clock, a.m./p.m., morning, afternoon, noon, midnight. Know the number of seconds in a minute and the number of days in each month, year and leap year.

Compare durations of events [for example to calculate the time taken by particular events or tasks].

History

This half term we will focus on the Roman Empire and it's impact on Britain. We will use evidence to describe the culture and leisure activities of the Romans. Use artefacts and sources to describe the clothes, way of life and actions of the Roman people and research buildings and their uses. This topic will culminate in a case study of nearby Ribchester.

French

Our unit this half term in French is Les Fruits. In this unit the children will learn how to:

- Name and recognise up to 10 fruits in French and attempt to spell some of these nouns.
- Ask somebody in French if they like a particular fruit.
- Say what fruits they like and dislike.

My Happy Mind

We will continue to use the My Happy Mind lessons to learn about our brains and help with our mental health. We will begin our next topic called 'Celebrate'. In this unit, we will focus on looking at our character strengths and learn that by understanding what they are and why using them as much as possible, we can be at our best

In PSHE, we will learn about 'Taking Risks' by focusing on risky situations, when can a risk become dangerous and understand that accidents happen but when possible we can minimise risk by acting sensibly and maturely.

Music

This half term, we will get creative with classical music. Learning through a BBC Ten Pieces unit, Rodeo – Hoedown by Aaron Copland. We will:

- Listen and reflect on a piece of orchestral music
- Create our own piece of music using instruments and voice
- Perform as an ensemble
- Learn musical language appropriate to the task

Art

This half term, we will be focusing on the art media of printing. We will create printing blocks using relief or impressed methods. We will print using repeating patterns and two colour overlays to create our own unique monoprints.

P.E.

In P.E this half term, we will focus on invasions games. Learning through the sport of rugby. We will be improving our understanding and key skills of attacking:

- Accurately passing and moving into space to keep possession
- Passing with disguise to outwit an opponent
- Implementing team tactics to outwit another team
- Combining running with ball and passing to score

Also this half term, we will be learning through striking and fielding

- Developing our skills of throwing, catching and striking
- We will use simple attacking and defending tactics e.g. working as a team to field the ball
- Use good decision making to combine our skills to play effectively in a small sided striking and fielding games.

Throughout our learning we will focus on the character value of honesty.




