### Government guidelines:

- A relaxing of the school uniform rule. Parents will be sent permission to allow children to wear their School PE kits.
- The School will insist that children come to School wearing a sunhat. Children will not be allowed to play outside without one.
- Whilst outdoors, children are encouraged to stay in the shade as much as possible. If the heat is extreme the School will activate it is wet play procedure and children will kept inside under supervision during break times.
- Parents will be advised to apply Sunscreen with high sun protection factors before the School day commences to protect their child's skin.
- Staff will encourage children to take off their blazers and jumpers.
- Games and PE lessons will be cancelled.
- Where possible, classroom doors and windows will be opened to encourage cross ventilation. The site manager will ensure windows are opened early in the morning, before children arrive.
- Electric lighting will be kept to a minimum and electrical equipment will be not be left in 'standby mode', as this generates heat.
- Mechanical fans will be used in classrooms to increase air movement.
- Children will have direct access to their water bottles in class and to the water fonts in the playground. Staff will encourage children to drink more water than usual in hot weather.

# Statutory Outcomes - 2025

We at St Mary's are proud to celebrate the amazing results our pupils have achieved in this year's statutory tests and assessments. These fantastic outcomes are a testament to the dedication, perseverance, and teamwork of our entire school community-teachers, support staff, parents, and most importantly, our incredible pupils.

A huge congratulations to all the children for their hard work and success. Our heartfelt thanks go to the teaching and support staff for their tireless efforts, and to parents for their unwavering support throughout the year.

# Foundation Stage

75% of pupils achieved a Good Level of Development at the end of Reception compared to 68% nationally.

Phonics Screening Year 1 79% of pupils passed the phonics screening.

**Multiplication Tables Check** Average score 22.7 (out of 25)





71% of pupils achieved full marks. Last year, the national figure was 34% so we are more than double that figure.

# Key Stage 2

Our Key Stage 2 results this year are above the national average. We are also proud to confirm that the percentage of pupils working at greater depth in reading, writing and maths —above the expected standard—exceeds both the national average and the average for Kensington and Chelsea. This is a truly outstanding achievement and a well-earned reflection of the dedication, effort, and high standards upheld by our pupils and staff.

The scaled score for Key Stage 2 ranges from 80 to 120. A score of 100 indicates that a pupil has met the expected standard, while a score of 110 or above reflects achievement at the higher standard or greater depth. Our Year 6 pupils have performed very well, as shown by their impressive average scaled scores. Congratulations to all on this fantastic achievement!

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# A message regarding Attendance and Punctuality from Ms Hampton

Dear Parents/Carers,

# Re: Attendance & Punctuality

Excellent attendance is fundamental to an excellent education. Our Attendance policy follows the policy outlined by the Education Secretary, stating that children are not to be absent from school for holidays or other non-essential reasons during term time. Only in exceptional or mitigating circumstances will an absence be approved.

## Illness

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If your child is unwell and unable to attend school or absent from school for any reason, please phone the school on 0208 2053790 before 8.40 am.

We have an answerphone where you can leave a message before the office opens, please speak clearly with your child's name, class and the reason your child is unwell. You can use the absence line from 8.00am to speak to a member of the office.

If we do not receive any information from a parent/carer in the morning, we will contact parents/ carers asking them to phone the school. If we do not hear from you we will pursue all contacts





regarding a child's absence as part of our safeguarding procedures. Please leave a message by 9.00 am each day of their absence.

If your child has either vomiting or diarrhea, they should stay at home for 48 hours from the last bout of illness. This is a recommendation from Public Health England to protect other pupils and staff. If a child is sent into school within the 48 hour period, we will contact the parents/carers and ask for the child to be collected from school.

Any absence can result in a loss of continuity for your child's education and upset their balance of learning. As a school, we are required to provide details of all unauthorised absences to the Local Authority.

# Medical and Dental appointments

We ask that you please make every effort to avoid booking medical and dental appointments during school time. Where this is unavoidable, parents/carers should put this in writing to the school office and attach a copy of the appointment card or letter before the date of the appointment. Please also include the time you will need to collect your child. If arriving late, please ensure that your child is accompanied and signed in by an adult at the school office for safeguarding reasons.

# **Other Absences**

Requests for absence during term time will not be authorised unless there is deemed to be an exceptional circumstance. Local Authorities have the power to serve parents with a Fixed Penalty Notice if a child has significant or repeated days of unauthorised absence.

# **Being Punctual**

School starts at 9.00 a.m. every day. Children need to be in their classrooms by 9 a.m. so that they can start their lessons promptly. Arriving at school on time and ready to learn is the best start to the day for our children.

It is important for your child to arrive at school on time if they are to get the most out of their education. Being late is disruptive for your child but also for all the other children in the class.

## Punctuality

5 minutes late every day means missing 3 days of school every year. Punctuality is continually monitored. The gates open 15 minutes before the school day begins. If your child arrives after this time, then they will be recorded as late in the register!

Attendance is regularly monitored by the local authority who will fine any unauthorised absences.

# Expectation of children being collected at the end of each day

We expect all parents/carers to collect their children on time. Once the gates have closed, the children who have not been collected are brought into the office. If there are exceptional



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circumstance which are causing a delay, please contact the office immediately.

We do not have capacity to look after any children who are not picked up after that time.

As you are aware, the office gets very busy and the children cannot be left unsupervised in the reception area as it might pose the safety risk.

Please, ensure that you have arrangements in place to pick up your children on time.

Aktiva, the company running Wrap-Around Care in the RBKC North Hub in Ark Brunel, does take one-off bookings, so please feel free to use their services in emergencies.

Avenues Youth Project offer after school activities and a Walking Bus service, where they collect the children at the end of the day. Please see the information below on how to sign your child up.

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# **Important Parents' Information**

# Uniform

Thank you to the vast majority of our pupils who wear their full school uniform. We have noticed that quite a few children do not have their ties whilst at school. Please, note that the school tie is part of our school uniform. Could you, please ensure that your child wears the tie to school every day,

Pupils should be wearing **school shoes** when they are not wearing trainers as part of their PE uniform. Quite a few pupils are wearing colourful trainers, which are **not** part of the uniform, and we ask that you kindly check with your child and make sure they wear full school uniform, which includes black shoes.

Please note that if for any reason your child is not in full school uniform or full PE kit, we expect a note from parents to explain why this is the case.









### Jewellery and Expensive items

As part of our school uniform, the children are allowed to wear small studs. Any long, dangling earrings might be the cause of accidents and therefore are not allowed. If children wear necklaces with any religious symbols, please, make sure that your child is aware that these need to be tucked under the clothing for health and safety reasons.

As you are aware, we advise that children do not bring any expensive items to school, as we **cannot take responsibility for loss or damage**. Only children in Y5 and Y6, who have permission to walk to and from school on their own, can bring phones to school. However, they have to hand them in at the gate and pick them up from their teachers at the end of the day. During school hours the phones are stored in the safe.

Pandora bracelets as well as other bracelets and necklaces or "smart" watches are **not allowed** as they can create a health and safety hazard. In addition, they are often expensive or hold sentimental value.

Additionally, as "smart" watches are connected to other devices via the Internet, they are therefore **not allowed at school** for **safeguarding reasons**. This is in line with government and local authority guidelines and we ask parents to help us ensure that these guidelines are followed.

## Attendance

Congratulations to all the pupils who achieved 100% attendance this week! Our overall attendance is the same as last week **is 92.07%.** This is extremely low and as a school community, we need to do much better. Our school target is <u>96.00%</u>.

If required we will arrange to meet with parents, to draw their attention to their children's absence. There is a strong correlation between school attendance and pupil outcomes. Please ensure your child is at school unless they are ill.

## Holiday during term time

The government policy is that holidays during term times are not permitted, therefore the school **cannot authorise** any absence due to holidays during term times. If you take your child/ren out of school for a holiday during term time, they will be referred to the Local Authority if necessary. Please note this for any plans you are making for the new academic year 2024-25. The Department for Education expects parents/carers to organise holidays outside of the school term dates. Your child/ren's learning will suffer by taking them out of school and it may result in disruptions to the learning of others. We have already referred some families to the local authority who will issue a penalty notice.

## Contacts

It is a requirement that the school has a minimum of **2 emergency telephone contact numbers** for your child. We need to be able to contact you at all times. Our admin team, endeavour to update













our data systems with your details termly. This is essential for the wellbeing of your children and we need your help to ensure that you are contactable at all times. If there are any changes for 2024-25, please ensure you contact the school office at the beginning of the new academic year.
