This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three

areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

The curriculum is planned with consideration for transition taking into account the expectation of the KS3 curriculum and planning in collaboration with local primary schools. The curriculum draws from elements of the model music curriculum (March 2021) and is adapted to suit the needs of our pupils and facilities that we have available. The department has a bespoke assessment policy that assesses musically and appropriately and is in alignment with school assessment strategy.

Our curriculum is skills based, progressing each unit and with links across each academic year at KS3. Pupils learn through whole class teaching to read traditional notation, perform on the keyboards, ukuleles and djembe, and to compose in specific forms. Pupils follow a "listening curriculum" which is how every lesson starts, allowing pupils to experience a wide range of musical styles and genres and to tacitly recognise the elements of music and how they are being used.

Curriculum music has the minimum of one weekly session per year group throughout the year, 1 hour each session. All curriculum music lessons take place in a specialised music environment

Singing is embedded into KS3 schemes of work, including the teaching of healthy singing. Specific songs are linked to each scheme of work and pupils sing every lesson at KS3.

At KS4 pupils follow the GCSE EDUQAS specification. Pupils have the opportunity to study for instrument specific grades throughout their school life, along with Grade 5 music theory which is tutored in the department.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

All pupils have access to opportunities to learn to play an instrument of their choice. We have appointed our own in-house team of experienced peripatetic teachers, and currently offer lessons on piano, voice, guitar, drums and woodwind. We are looking to expand this offering out to include brass and strings.

All GCSE Music pupils are offered instrumental lessons free of charge.

Year 7 pupils who receive Pupil Premium funding are offered instrumental lessons free of charge. Pupils in all years can apply to use part of their Pupil Premium funding to fund instrumental lessons.

Currently 87 pupils receive instrumental lessons in school, 11.4% of the school population. This tuition is on site and the figure does not include pupils who receive instrumental tuition outside of school. Our aim is to bring this to 15% of the schools population.

The music department offers the following ensembles for pupils take part in:

Choir

Harmony Group

Ukulele Group

Brass group

Woodwind Group

Rock bands

All musical ensembles are provided free of charge and are open to all pupils, except for Harmony group which is based on current ability due to the nature of the repertoire. Rehearsals take place at lunchtimes and after school.

Additional opportunities are given for pupils to rehearse independently on their chosen instrument at breaks in the school day and after school.

The department provides space for pupils to rehearse or practice individually or in groups in our practice rooms and additional teaching space. This can be booked out by pupils at breaktime, dinner and after school each day.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

As a school, singing is an integral part of our daily worship and as such, we sing each day in assemblies.

Pupils are given regular opportunities to perform throughout the school year, with the following concerts planned for year 2024 – 25:

December – Year 7 concert – all Year 7 pupils to perform

December – Christmas Concert – all musical ensembles to perform

February – Band Night – selected KS3 performances

April - GCSE Performance Evening - GCSE Music pupils

July – Summer Arts Festival. – all musical ensembles to perform.

Audiences are invited into school for all of the above events. Additionally the pupils are invited to be part of the audience to support each other and provide further opportunities to see live music. Tickets are free.

We also run school productions – auditions are held and parts are open to anyone across the school.

We have strong links with 2 Post 16 providers and attend performances at their campus. This last year we visited Westholme School to watch Les Miserables, and Runshaw College to watch their A Level Performance Evening.

Enrichment trips to see live performances take place each term. So far, this academic year 2 have taken place.

Within school, we are providing music workshops on African Drumming and Piano Masterclasses.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

1. Developing use of Music Technology at KS3. Whilst this is a cornerstone of our work at KS4, our facilities do not allow for use at KS3. This year we aim to develop our composition units to be ICT based with improved computers and midi keyboards in the

- designated music classroom.
- 2. Increase numbers of pupils receiving instrumental tuition to 15% of the schools population (numbers to include pupils who receive lessons outside of school provision).
- 3. Increase opportunities for pupils to see live music through trips and through visiting ensembles to school.
- Develop ensemble provision with the development of Woodwind Group, Djembe Ensemble and Guitar Ensemble. Performance opportunities for all ensembles to be provided at main concerts.
