Volunteering





- To indicate you are interested in your child participating you need to complete a registration form and return to school with the non-refundable DoE registration fee of £25.00.
- Included in the envelope your child should also attach a Letter of no more than 500 words explaining why they want to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme and both should be placed in the box outside the main office by the end of school on Friday 30th Nov.
- Competition for places has been strong in the past so pupils are advised to think carefully about the qualities required to complete the award and write about these in their application. They also need to say what they plan to do for the skill, volunteering and physical aspects of the award.
- I will inform the pupils of the outcome of their application before the Christmas holidays, after which further details will be posted.
